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### NINETEENTH ANNUAL STATE CONGRESS ELKINS — 1957

West Virginia, continuing its predilection for co-champions, conferred the honors on Donald Burdick and Dr. Werthammer. Both of these gentlemen have shared this eminent position several times in recent years, as 6 of the past 10 championship events have resulted in ties for first place.

Charles T. Morgan, now of Philippi, was next in line.

The Open was played as a round robin, as only 6 members contested. It was won by Charles Ritter of Wheeling, with a perfect score. James Ballard and Ted Baker, both of Huntington, placed second and third (see tables).

The small but representative tournament was strengthened by the return of Micijah "Mike" Wren, unofficial champion of West Virginia in the early thirties.

The Elkins Chess Club and the YMCA provided spacious and comfortable playing quarters, and a friendly atmosphere that was much appreciated.

### EDITORIAL

While our group was small, the business meeting was held per schedule and officers were elected.

Assuming the chair, Dr. Hayward arranged playing details of the forthcoming congress. A 5-round Swiss was approved for the Championship and similar round robin for the Open. Not enough players were present to hold a junior event.

The President assumed the position of tournament director and was ably assisted by all of the members present.

After adjournment Dr. Hayward asked Paul Sayre of Huntington to assume the Editor's position on the Bulletin. Mr. Sayre accepted and this is his first issue.

As discussed in the meeting the importance of payment of annual dues cannot be put lightly aside. Our list of members is large enough to cover necessary expenses and it is hoped that all in arrears (only 16 playing members in Elkins tournament are excepted) will respond promptly to this urgent call, and send \$2.00 to our treasurer as soon as possible.

### KOLTANOWSKI TO DIRECT TRI-STATE

On Saturday and Sunday, November 9-10, Huntington will again be host to the Tri-State Chess Congress. The top two players of Ohio, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia will compete in a "closed" 6-player round robin. A similar closed

junior event may be held. The Ohio Valley Open, a 5-round Swiss, will provide an opportunity for all interested players irrespective of their strength or ratings. Three dollars is the entry fee for the Open. The other two events are without expense to the contestants.

Registration time: 12 Noon, Saturday, November 9.

Place: Hotel Governor Cabell, 4th Avenue and 9th Street.

Two rounds to be played Saturday, November 9, 3 on Sunday, November 10.

Tournament Director: George Kolanowski.

It is planned as a special feature to have Mr. Kolanowski give an exhibition at the Hotel Governor Cabell Friday evening, November eighth.

Hotel recommended is the "Governor Cabell".

Excellent and the only move to catch the N.
