THE 25TH ANNUAL STATE TOURNAMENT. Charleston, 1963.

The Silver Jubilee state tournament was held in Charleston over the Labor Day weekend. A record number of players--31--entered the Senior Championship, including 13 unrated players, and four out-of-state visitors. There were only three left in the Junior Championship after three others decided to change over to the rated Senior tournament.

John D. Downes of New Martinsville, a strong player and a welcome newcomer to West Virginia chess, won with a score of $5\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$, defeating among others Stanley Kundin of Laurel, Md., H. Landis Marks of Huntington, and Robert Bonwell of Charleston, and drawing with Dr. S. Werthammer of Huntington. Downes is now a member of the Wheeling chess club.

Four others tied for second to fifth places with $4\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$ --Edward M. Fry of Charleston, Dr. Werthammer, Bonwell, and Harry McKinney of South Charleston, ranking in that order on the median tie-break. Bonwell is one of three promising new players from Charleston. The other two, James Haught and Dr. Cornelio Nolasco, sandwiched the writer in the next bracket at 4-2. They are "promising" only because this was their first rated tournament--actually they have already arrived in every sense but experience. The 4-2 bracket also included Raymond Gillies of Burtonsville, Md.

In the Junior Championship, William Rice of Huntington and Edwin McClelland, Jr., of St. Albans, were co-champions in a double round-robin of three players. "Third" was Wayne Weaver of St. Albans.

David Marples and Dan Lowder were the hard-working tournament directors.

The new champion, 21-year-old John Downes, is a native of Morgantown. He learned the game at a Michigan high school. After finishing college he moved to New Martinsville where he works at the Pittsburgh Plate Glass chemical plant. He is the first state champion from the northern part of the state, marking a healthy new trend.

Dr. Nolasco, although unrated, won the \$5 upset prize, voted last year at Wheeling, for defeating the top-rated player, Marks (2091). Other notable upsets were those of Dr. Alex Darbes (1971) by James Haught, unrated, and of Dr. Werthammer by Bonwell, respectively 1940 and 1588, although the latter is a 1961 rating and very much out-dated.

BUSINESS SESSION

At the business session; Paul Sayre was elected president, Tom Sweeney was elected vice-president, and Tom Bergquist was re-elected secretary-treasurer.

The principal topic of discussion was the Tri-State Tournaments to be held at Wheeling, Nov. 9-10. The McLure Hotel, the best in town, was agreed on as the site, and Mr. Sweeney and Don McKee will help with the arrangements.

There will be an important change in the Junior Tournament: it will be rated from now on. (This will, of course, require the use of clocks.)

TOURNAMENT TALK

To deal with a possible clock shortage in the Junior Championship, how would it be to hold this event on a separate weekend from the senior tournament? This is done in Ohio with good results. Separate dates would allow us to devote more attention to each tournament, and do a better job on them. It would also allow stronger juniors to enter both tournaments, and more and better juniors might enter their own event. At present, when the boys reach 16, they feel grown-up and want to be in the senior event. What about this suggestinn--a junior state tournament, rated, held possibly at the Charleston YMCA on the third weekend in July. (Huntington Open is second weekend in June.) Subject open for discussion.

...James Schroeder of Ohio asks if there would be any interest in correspondence match between W. Va. and Ohio. This would help us to get acquainted with our neighbors and learn more about the game. If interested, write me.

Those who have moved out of the state are Hurt, Crede, Burdick, and Morgan, Hurt, in Memphis, and Morgan, in Phoenix, are still active. Burdick, now a Ph. D., has given up the game except as coach of the Duke team. Crede moved to Iowa.

Still in the state, but inactive, are Hartling and Liggett. DuVall won the 1962 Charleston championship, but plays only occasionally. Wren died a few years ago.

All of the 6 ties, including the famous 5-way one in 1955, took place in a 10-year period. Dr. Werthammer was in 5 of them, and also has won outright 7 times, thus winning or sharing in 12 championships, in 16 years.

All on the list were from Huntington or the Charleston area till 1963. Of the 36 listings, 23 are Huntington players, and 12 are from Charleston.

MEMORIES AT THE QUARTER-CENTURY

Our 25th state tournament was an important milestone in our history. When you think of all the work in one year--the preparation, the actual tournament, and the many details to be cleared up afterward, and multiply these by 25, it makes quite a record of achievement. In the list of cham-

pions each has contributed something to the game and to the Association. To their names should be added those of the past bulletin editors: Gene Collett, now dead, was said to have put out the first 90 issues, and played an important part in forming and building the Association and the Tri-State tournament. Reid Holt took over for a few years, I believe. He moved to St. Louis. And the next was my close friend and "mentor", Dr. V. S. Hayward, also passed on. He was editor during most of the fifties, and also a tireless promoter and teacher of the young, and general all-around benefactor. In the related field of chess columning, Ed Foy is the dean, and he is also one of our few charter members still active. A steadying influence, he likes to see the Association follow a consistent line of development--even as his chess games.

Keepers of the records and funds are second to none in importance. Of these I can recall years of service by William Hartling, Charles Morgan, and Tom Bergquist, our present dependable incumbent.

Tournament directors, whose job is incorrectly referred to as "thankless", are deeply appreciated by all thoughtful players. In addition to those just mentioned, they have included Dr. Alex J. Darbes, Mr. A. G. Dobbs of Wheeling, David Marples, and many others.

The role of the late Mr. A. W. Paull of Wheeling as a friend and financial backer of the WVCA is in a class by itself. He could always be depended on in a tight spot. His good friend Tom Sweeney is doing a fine job of carrying on the Wheeling tradition.

These are only a few of the outstanding names in our history. Do we have anything like a group spirit? The best answer seems to be, almost, but not quite. Sometimes something seems to be lacking, and I believe it is the fact we meet too infrequently to develop such a spirit. Will the extra tournaments and team matches we are planning help this difficulty? Let's hope so.

At any rate, I hope recalling the names of these players will not only recall what they did for its sentimental value, but help us feel we are part of an organization with a long tradition, and therefore with good prospects for the future. Although we have had hard times, we have always managed to keep going somehow, and I believe we always will. Wouldn't it be something to look ahead to the 100th tournament and see the players and their games? We can't, of course, but we can help pave the way, one year at a time. And who knows, we might at least make the "Golden Jubilee"!

WEST VIRGINIA HOSTS THE TRI-STATE. We need your support.

The Tri-State Championship was originally thought of as a chance for the champions and runners-up of the three states of Ohio, Pennsylvania, and West Virginia to "grab a little more glory". And that is still the idea today. I thought it would "raise prestige" to include masters, but this is really not in keeping with the original idea, so the "improvement" was dropped. Eligibility is detailed on page one.

The concurrent Ohio Valley Open is a fine chance for the rest of us to keep our game fresh, get some valuable experience, and enjoy the fellowship of chess with players of like mind from neighboring states. Competition is both stronger and weaker than in the state tournament, so you will score about the same.

Our attendance at recent tournaments has been too low. In fact, this may be a decisive year for us. There has been a suggestion that Ohio and Pennsylvania take over this event every other year instead of every third year and leave us out. Would you want this to happen? If not, help make it a success. Draw a circle around Nov. 9-10, and really plan to be there.
