Chess and Sportswriters, from Ed Foy's column.

In sports and other kinds of competitive activity-- including chess -- there are certain scenes and personalities which still remain in a sort of suspended animation long after the spectacular event or individual has passed.

In the world of sports, a Grantland Rice would write of an Army Notre Dame football game in 1924 and Stuhldreher, Miller, Lyden and Crowley are still remembered as the "Four Horsemen", or a DamonRunyon could make Jack Dempsey's comeback knockout victory over Jack Sharkey seem of epic Proportions.

But, alas, chess has no such Bob Considine or John Kiernan or Shorty Hardman or Dick Hudson to record-on the spot-great moments of the Royal Game! True, these chess milestones are not so obvious. The least lukewarm sports follower could thrill to Babe Ruth's blast off Charley Root, following his dramatic gesture toward the center field bleachers; but even a chessmaster would need to study a bit over A. Nimzovitsch's 25..., P-R3 (the quietest winning move) in his famous game with F. Saemisch, in Copenhagen, 1923

Chess, too, treasures many dramatic and memorable happenings. Take Harry Pillsbury's introduction to the European chess arena, Hastings, 1895. The young 22-year old American was hardly thought worthy to compete in this tournament with the cream of the chess world, and his first-round loss to Tchigorin did little for his reputation. He also lost to Dr. Lasker and to Carl Schlechter, but by the time the tourney ended Pillsbury had won first prize!

The chess world particularly remembers one other glittering victory in Pillsbury's all too short career: For eight years he waited for a chance to bring a victory out of the same type of position in which he had lost to Dr. Lasker. The opportunity came in the Cambridge Springs Tournament, 1904, and Pillsbury played the move he should have played in the first Lasker game and won! But it was almost the last game he ever played; his health was very poor and he had not much longer to live.

In 1911, at San Sebastian, Spain, another youthful player from the New World stunned the European masters when Jose R. Capablanca won his first game in an international tournament in the first round, receiving first brilliancy prize. He went on to win the tournament, and he later became world champion. The wheel turns. In 1935, young Samuel Reshevsky won his first foreign tournament at Margate, England, beating Capablanca. Reshevsky had declined the offer of a draw. "I thought I could win," he said, "and I could not hope to become a grandmaster by accepting draws in winning positions."

Great games and great tournaments stir the imagination of chess followers. Frank J. Marshall's brilliant queen sacrifice against S. Lewitsky actually drew a shower of gold coins from enthusiastic spectators!

(Editor's Note: Could Ed himself be the writer he is looking for? His style seems ideal for West Virginia chess, at least.)

CHARLESTON CHESS CLUB CHAMPIONSHIP 1969

This one-a-week event began in February as a Swiss but was revised into a double round robin of 6 players. In early rounds Joe Barker led but had to withdraw, and later Charles Szász did likewise. After the field was reduced to 6, the final winner was Carl Kiser $6\ 1/2-3\ 1/2$. Robert Stewart was second at 6-4, and Bill Truslow was third, $5\ 1/2-4\ 1/2$. The games of the withdrawn players were cancelled. The tournament lasted some $3\ 1/2$ months. None of Charleston's many fine Class A players took part.

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SZASZ PROMOTES JUNIOR CHESS. From Foy's column and Editor's interviews with Szasz.

Charles Szasz organized and directed two large Junior tournaments on the Morris Harvey Campus in April with the College Chess Club as Sponsor.

The Kanawha Valley High School Chess Tournament was a 6 round event played at 30 moves in 60 minutes. This two day event was won by Charleston Catholic with 32 points. St. Albans was second with 30, and Herbert Hoover third with 23 1/2. Individuals scoring at least 5 points were Carl Kiser, Hank Chinn, Robin Keating, Clifford Thomas, Mark Smith, and Walter Braunlin.

Nine teams and 66 players took part. The other six teams in order of finish were Stonewall Jackson, George Washington, Dunbar, Charleston, Nitro, and Southe Charleston.

Szasz got the idea for the tournament from Ed Foy's column in the Sunday Gazette-Mail. Foy reported on a series of team matches by several school clubs. Szasz, in order to create interest, gave a "simul" at several schools, followed by a talk advertising his tournament.

The 5th Annual Intercollegiate Chess Tournament, also held in April, was won by the Glenville State team, 14 1/2 points. Marshall University was second with 11 1/2 and Morris Harvey third with 11 points. The other two teams represented W. Va. Tech and W. Va. University. This was a 30 - 30 tournament, with all five rounds played on a Saturday. Twenty-two players took part.

For additional chess clocks for the two tournaments, Szasz drove to Huntington and Ashland - first to borrow the clocks, and then to return them. The clocks were assigned primarily to the slow players, who were "fingered" by their team captains before the tournament.

Editor's Note: It has seemed to me for years that it takes only time and thought to make a large, active chess organization or a successful tournament. The "work" part of it is really not hard. Charles Szasz put these two elements to gether in good style in his promotions.
