THE EDITOR SPEAKS:

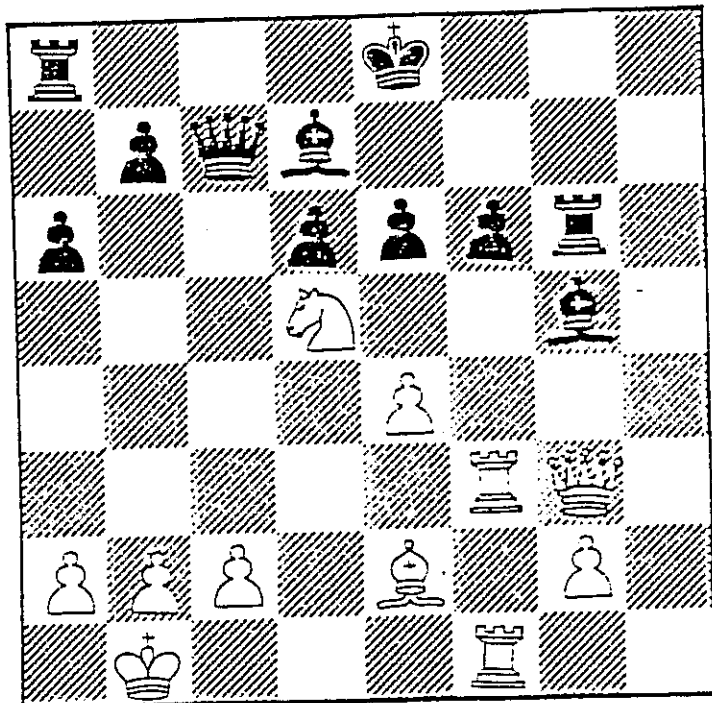
Because no one wrote me a letter this time I am assuming it is my turn to speak. This letter is directed to those of you who are up and coming players who wish to keep on going. In as much as I am the only West Virginian to win a major out of state tournament that I know of I am hereby proclaiming myself qualified to preach at you people about how it is done. So sit up, listen up and take head.

Let me begin by first giving you these wise words of wisdom; PLAY MAIN LINE OPENINGS, leave the patzers play the weird garbage openings- the main lines will teach you chess and prepare you for the masters who make near snacks of garbage openings. PLAY AGGRESSIVELY, the summit of swiss system chess is no place for the timid, the best defense has always and will always be a good offense. STUDY THE ENDGAME, the first and foremost quality of a master is a precise endgame- you will remember the openings better by learning them the hard way over the board, so don't spend all your time studying them, study your endgame instead. PLAY LOTS OF RATED CHESS, this is where you learn your openings and middlegames - this is the only way you will learn what systems you like and what what systems are suited to your style. There is no teacher like experience.

To conclude I am going to give you the critical third round game of the 1977 Buckeye Open, May 28-29, Columbus Ohio. After this game I went on to win the tournament $4\frac{1}{2}-\frac{1}{2}$, $\frac{1}{2}$ point ahead of the field which included four masters and seven experts.

WEST VIRGINIA CHESS ASSOCIATION CONSTITUTION

Article 1

The name of this organization shall be the West Virginia State Chess Association.

Article 2

Its purpose shall be to promote acquaintance, understanding, and fellowship among chess players of West Virginia.
To conduct an annual Chess Congress and such other events as the board of directors shall elect.

Article 3

Membership shall consist of all interested in the Game of Chess. There shall be an annual meeting held preferably during the Congress for the purpose of electing officers ~~and directors~~ and transacting association business. Members in good standing are entitled to vote in person and by ~~or~~ mailed proxy if unable to attend.

There shall be the following classes of members:

Honorary life members—no dues.

Sustaining Members, who in addition to annual dues, make contributions.

Members over 21 years of age—dues \$5.00 annually.

Junior members are under 21 years of age—dues \$3.00 annually.

Membership dues are payable in advance, with credit given for expired quarters.

Fiscal year shall begin and end with Labor Day.

Residence outside of the state is not a bar to membership.

Membership assures the following privileges:

All members in good standing shall receive all copies of the WVCA Bulletin.

Any member is entitled to compete in tournaments held.

It is understood that no competitor is eligible to receive recognition as State Champion in any ~~tourney~~ if not a resident of West Virginia.

Article 4

Officers of this Association shall be President, Vice-President and Secretary-Treasurer duly elected at an annual meeting.

The Board of Directors shall be elected on a basis of county membership.

Any county with five members shall be entitled to one director and one additional director for every additional ten members. Members in counties having less than five members shall be grouped as Members-at-Large and are entitled to one director. These board members are to be elected in the same manner and at the same time as the officers. Officers shall act as ex-officio members of the Board of Directors.

The President shall preside at annual Congress and all meetings. He will appoint committees and Bulletin Editors.

The Vice-President will preside in the absence of the President, or act as his designate when requested by him. Particularly interest himself in matters concerning the annual Tri-State Tournament and matches.

The Secretary-Treasurer shall collect all dues and monies owing this Association. He shall keep on file minutes of Association meetings and a digest of all committee activities. He will submit these to the Bulletin for publication. He will also be required to submit an annual report of Association finances. He will pay all accounts of indebtedness that have been certified for payment by the President or Vice-President. He will carry on correspondence for the Association.

~~The Board of Directors shall formulate a program of chess promotion for each year and be the final power and directing authority.~~

Article 5

The constitution for this association may be amended by a two-thirds vote of the entire membership.

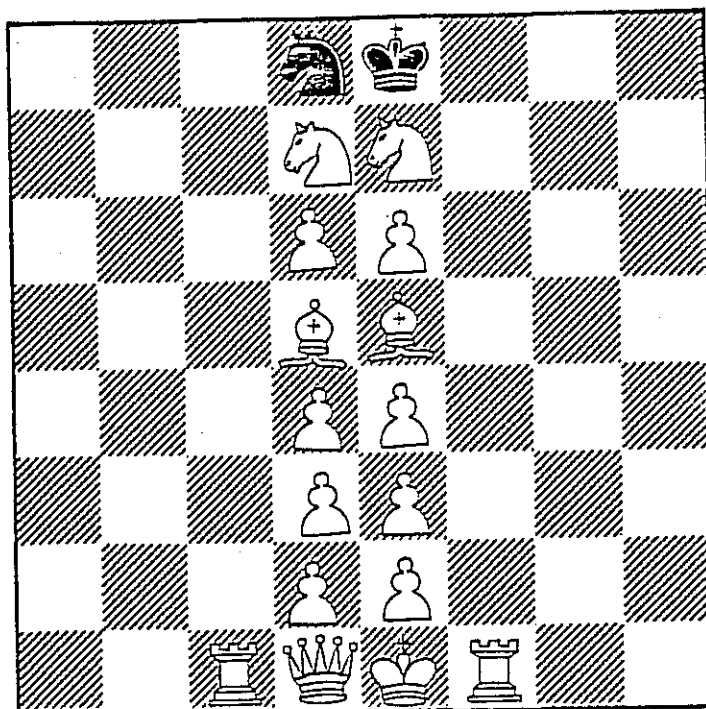

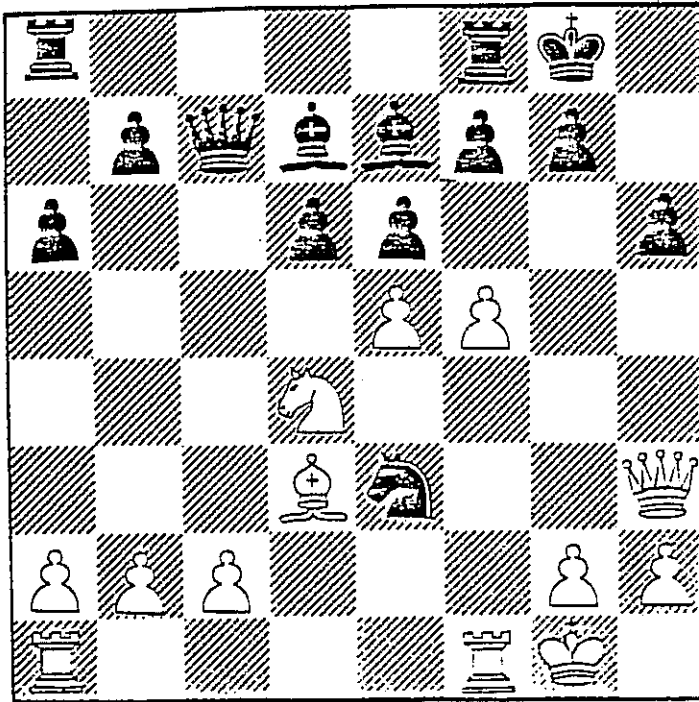

1977 WEST VIRGINIA JUNIOR HIGH SCHOOL CHAMPIONSHIP

The 1977 West Virginia Junior High School Individual and Team Chess Championship was held in the recreation room of the Saint Albans Water and Sewer Department Building, Saint Albans WV on June 4-5, 1977. The tournament consisted of six rounds, three on Saturday and three Sunday and was run as a Swiss System, non-elimination tournament with the top four scorers from a school counting as a team. The time limit was forty-five moves in ninety minutes. The tournament director was Charles Szasz who also directed the senior high tournament. The tournament was sponsored by the West Virginia Chess Association and the Saint Albans Recreation Department, a non-profit organization with all proceeds going to the promotion of this tournament and the purchase of prizes and trophies. Fourteen teams and sixty-one players took part in this year's event. Tom Snodgrass of Mannington Junior High captured top individual honors with a perfect 6-0 score.
