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1977 STATE CHAMPIONSHIP  
3-5 Sep 77

The state championship was held at West Virginia University on September third through the fifth. Thirty-seven chess players entered the annual tournament with Paul E Harless (from Huntington) and Dennis E Funkhouser (from Nitro) emerging as co-champions. Both players went undefeated--each posting four wins and only two draws. Dennis and Paul each had two crucial games in the tournament. Funkhouser's vital games came in the third and sixth rounds when he defeated Joe Barker and Jeff Ashley, respectively, both of whom have been Experts and former state champions. Paul's important games were in the fifth round when he drew defending champion Ashley (a game in which both players were afraid to play on) and in the sixth round when he beat Pat Kelly.

William Squire and Jeff Ashley tied for third with scores of  $4\frac{1}{2}$ - $1\frac{1}{2}$ . Squire was one of the surprises of the tournament losing only to Kelly in the second round.

Eight people tied for fifth place. They included Pat Kelly, Donald W Griffith, John W Dudley, Mark Smith, Byron Funkhouser, James M McAlister, Mark Hathaway (who was named the junior champion), and Carl Kiser.

The tournament was directed by Jason Cook who has just received his intermediate tournament directorship from the United States Chess Federation.

SPEED CHAMPIONSHIP

The first annual speed championship was held September 4, 1977 in conjunction with the State Championship. Nineteen players competed with Jeff Ashley, John Dudley, and Donald Griffith (all members of the WVU chess club) tying for first with identical 6-2 scores. Paul Harless placed a solo second with  $5\frac{1}{2}$ - $2\frac{1}{2}$ .

The tournament was hotly contested and there were several upsets. Proof of this came from the fine showing of Bill Coleman, a Fairmont High student, who defeated Barker, Ancrile, and Cunningham.

John Dudley directed the eight-round event which, hopefully, will become an annual fixture on the state chess scene.

Griffith drew Zaffuto in the third round and beat Sukiennik (1683), Mark Smith (1675), and Joe Ancrile (1663). Zaffuto, in addition to drawing Griffith, defeated John Dudley (1818), Byron Funkhouser (1609), and David Hunt (1333).

Sukiennik, Dudley, and Harold Ashcraft tied for third place with scores of  $2\frac{1}{2}-1\frac{1}{2}$ .
