At the end of the fifth round, the pieces were 'stilled' and Manual Armada of Charleston emerged the victor. He played very steady chess throughout the tournament and deserved to win. Regrettably, that couldn't be said for almost all the remaining players. This tournament had more blunders on top boards than this reporter had seen in many a tournament. This contributed in no small part to a large group of upsets and poorly played games. It should be noted that not everyone had this problem; Jerry Skeen of Charleston and Reggie Best of Parkerburg, both Category II players, posted fine 4-1 scores to tie for second place and splitting the class II prize money. Jerry's score was more than good enough to move him well up into Category I. Another laudable performance was made by Jimmy Sowder, who beat several times former state champ David Marples in the second round and then in the third round drew current state champ Dennis Funkhouser while the exchange and a pawn up. Next time, Dennis may not be so lucky. As for the games, well as you will see (or in many cases not see) some players did produce some interesting games.
