THE WEST VIRGINIA CHAMPIONSHIP, THE HAT TRICK, AND OTHER WANDERINGS by M.R.Barker

Well, the 46th annual State Chamrionship is history. I return and almost pull off a winning or sharing a third consecutive title. The tournament proves to be the strongest ever! These aren't a bad group subjects for a chess article.

First off, yes, it is I , marvelous Mary who writes these lines! Most of you thought I was gone for good, off to South Carolina and good ridance. However, I was unable to sell my home in Charleston and had to return. That is great for me but bad news for you! Now you'll have to put up with my "rabbit bashing!, writing, and sounding off in print!

Enough rambling, the tournament this year was by far the strongest ever held. There were three masters (two from out of state!), half a dozen strong candidate masters, and an assortment of you lesser types. (Joe means fish-Editor)

As for the "Hat Trick", only one West Virginian has ever done that and he did it with one to spare! That person was Donald Burdich, who accomplished the deed from 1954 through 1957. Strangely, he is one of the only three State Champions of the past I never met. (The other two are Mike Wren and Walter Crede.) I have heard Dave Marples refer to Burdich in a tone of sheer awe. Burdich must have been one hell of a player. In any event, a chance to accomplish this and perhaps to have a shot at four in a row would be quite an honor. (Stevie Gerrard eat your heart out.)

This is poor. Black needs to

play ... Nc4-e5!? with the idea of 16.f4 Ng4 attacking e3 or on 16.Rd6 Ke7 followed by ... Rac8 or Red8 to exploit his lead in development. It appears that after 15... Ne5 Black has compensation for the pawn. How did you plan to meet this, Al? 16.Nf3 O-O 17.Kd2 Rac8 18.Ng5 Rc5?

Another wasted tempo. 19.Nge4 Rc6 20.Rc1 Bf5 21.Bd3 Rfc8 22.Nd5 Kf8 23.f3 b5 24.g4

Bd7 25.Ng5

White has completed his development and takes the iniative. 25...h6 26.Nh7+ Ke8 27.g5 hg5 28.Ng5 Rc5 29.e4 Nd4 30.Rc5 Rc5 31.Ke3 Ne6 32.Rg and White won shortly. An interesting game and a good start for one of the co-champs to be.



Black could draw after 45.Nd5 anyway with ...Nd3+ 46.Kdl Nf2+ 46.Kel Nd3+ if 46... Re6 had not worked. I, of course, saw none of this during the game and had it shown to me after the game. (It is better to be lucky than to be good!) -Notes by J.Roush

White needs to play 18.fg6 and then 19.c4. What follows is a real disaster. I just did not see a single threat of John's. As a matter of fact when the game was over I told him that "I never saw it coming."as we left the tournament room. Everyon cracked up. At least the game was good for a laugh. The real cause of it was the previous round. I had battered down Donald Griffith in a very difficult R and Pawn ending which was adjourned. I was very tired. John got the benefit of my fatigue, but it catches up with him in the sixth round.

(Editor's Note: I never beat a healthy chess player. "ith regards to my sixth round debacle, I am quite relieved to find out that fatigue was the culprit! For the longest time I thought I simply got thrashed!)

BLUEFIELD

The annual Bluefield Open was won by Klaus Pohl of South Carolina. National Master Pohl turned in a spotless performance with a final record of 5-0.

Once again, the Bluefield Open was the largest non-scholastic tournament in West Virginia in 1984. This year's event drew 85 players including 3 masters and 7 experts. (Last year 82

competed.)

Tournament Director Jim Myers writes, "Not surprizingly, we get a lot of players from outside of West Virginia, but I think this year we probably had the lowest amount of West Virginia players we have ever had." Jim shouldn't be discouraged, even Jesus noted that prophets are not honored in their home town or state as it were. Apparently out of state players know a good thing when they see it!

In a tournament this size, there are many stories. We will focus on only two: The prodigy and the piece sac.

THE FRODIGY

Plex Chang! Who else qualifies for the title prodigy? (Sister Angela perhaps?) Alex currently resides in Richwood, West Virginia. He is the highest rated U.S. chess player in the 7-8 year age group. (Angela Chang is number 2 in the 9-10 year age grour!) Finally, Alex had an exceptionally good tournament at Bluefield this year. A glance at the crosstable reveals that Alex went undefeated and drew Dennis Funkhouser(2155), Fusty Fotter(2348), and Allen Cooley(2115)! Regarding Alex's game with Potter, Jim Myers writes, "He had Potter clearly beaten, but got careless (or worn out) near the end and let him off."

Alex is clearly on his way up. Myers further comments, "...his performance at Eluefield could only be described as spectacular for an eight-year-old. If you would like to "discover" the next chess celebrity before Chess Life does, now is your chance." (Unfortunately none of Alex's games from Bluefield are available. Examples of Alex's play from the State Championship can be found elsewhere in this issue.)

THE PIECE SAC

For years this humble editor has studied the following line as white: l.e4 c5 2.Nf3 d6 3.d4 cd4 4.Nd4 Nf6 5.Nc3 a6 6.Bg5 e6 7.f4 Be7 8.Qf3 Qc7 9.0-0-0 Mbd7 10.g4. All this time I hoped for the continuation 10... b5 11. Bf6 Nf6 12. g5 Nd7 13. f5 Nc5 14. f6 gf6 15. gf6 Bf8 so that I could essay the obscure sac 16.Nf5!? Alas, I never got the opportunity. In my despair I turned to 6.Ee3 vs. the Najdorf and eventually ceased playing l.e4 at all. In round III, at Eluefied that undeserving Smith-Morra playing swine Bob Bukovac had the opportunity to not only play this line, but to play it against a high rated Najdorf fanatic, Rusty Potter! green with envy! Here is the game.

Good, bad, or ugly this was a fun move to play. Those with a penchant for this kind of wild tactical garbage could investi-gate the "quiet declined variation" (16...b4 17.Bb5+). Those interested in the history of this line should seek out the game Klosterman-Popescu, Corr. 1972-1973. (Editor s note: This game is quoted but not explained in virtually all of the Najdorf monographs.)

16...ef5 17.Nd5 0b8 A theoretical novelty. The first origional move of the game. Black's plan involves the tandom manoeuvers Nc5-d7-e5 and Ra8-a7(-d7) Despite the lopsided score in this variation, this plan demonstrates just how unclear and unexplored the complications after 16.Nf5 are. Therefore, before you write-off the Rajdorf completely, remember that after the Yugoslav Attack was discovered people wrote-off the Dragon. New ideas were found and now the Oragon is once again a viable defence. Further analysis might show this line to be just as resilient. In short I want to attach a firm "Caveat Emptor" label to this variation. 18.ef5 Hd7 19.Bg2 Bb7?

Clearly inconsistent. Rusty mixes two systems and comes up short. More in line with his stated intentions was either 19... Ne5 or 19... Ra7. 20. Rhel+ Ne5 21.0c3! (+-)

This carries the devastating threat of 22.Re5+. Finding nothing better, White bails out with the following. 21...Bh6+ 22.Kbl Bd5 23.Bd5 0-0 24.Qh3 Kh8 25.Qh6 Rg8 26.Rg1

Here and later on Ba8 wins very simply. I got caught up in what I thought was the thematic execution of White's advantage. (Editor's note: Blood Lust?!)

Good enough, but more spectacular is 30.Bf7+ Kf7 31.Qh7! +-. Possibly, this was the thematic conclusion I was


