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1987 WEST VIRGINIA CHAMPIONSHIP

Dennis Funkhouser captured the 1987 state title at Morgantown over the Labor Day weekend. Dennis scored 5.5-.5, yielding only one draw to John Roush. David Hines, Greg Martin, and John Roush tied for second a point off the pace with records of 4.5-1.5.

Paul Davis and Jeff Crook tied for first in class "B". Michael Turner and Mike Baker finished dead even for first in class "C". Jack Burgazli copped the top spot in class "D" while Robert Maier pulled off the same trick in class "E"/Unrated. The junior title was shared by the Richwood wunderkinder Angela and Alex Chang.

Dougie Lane captured the 1987 Speed Chess title which was also contested in Morgantown over the weekend. There were six participants in this affair including Dennis Funkhouser who finished second.

Richard S. Currant directed the tournament which was held at the Quality Inn on September 5, 6, and 7, 1987. The crosstable and games from the event were provided by Richard.

CHARLESTON CHESS CLUB EAST-WEST MATCH

The "East" prevailed in the annual Charleston Chess Club East-West Match by a score of 2.5-1.5. This event was contested on July 14, 1987 at St. John's Episcopal Church in Charleston, West Virginia.

This summer event traditionally matches club members east of the Elk River against those who live west of the small river. Usually the participants are divided into evenly numbered teams by geography. This sometimes results in the boundary shifting slightly away from the Elk, but no one seems to mind as long as a rated game is available.
