# Jerry Gogol Clinches First in WV Postal Championship

Jerry Gogol finished his games in the 1995-96 West Virginia Postal Championship by drawing Terry Riley and beating Jason Rihel. Jerry, of Follansbee has clinched at least a tie for first with a score of 7-0-2. Only John Roush can catch Jerry, but must win his three remaining games with Gilbert Stone, Jason Rihel, and Tim Goan to add to his 4-0-2 score. Markle Butcher, Jason Rihel and Former WV Postal Champ Terry Riley are also vying for place and show honors. Markle is 5-2-1, Jason 5-2 and Terry has completed with a 5-3-1 mark. Terry had a pretty good tournament except for the three French Defenses he faced, vs. Roush, Butcher and Funkhouser. Here are some recently completed games from the tournament.

# Grant Perks Sweeps Parkersburg Homecoming

Grant Perks defeated Randy Bierce in the final round to take sole possession of first place and win the fourth annual Parkersburg Homecoming Open. Perks, an Ohio resident also took the \$100 bonus donated by Eastern Electric. Weston's Byron Funkhouser had an excellent tourney, beating class-A Mike Taylor and Fred Whitacre and drawing with 1995 State Champ Andy Katz. The tie for third included: Bierce, Jim Gikas, Markle Butcher and Bob Shock. Shock defeated Whitacre and Gary Morris in gaining over 60 ratings points.

Joe Ancrile filled in for Pat Kelly as tourney director (Pat was participating in the U.S. Open in Alexandria, VA). Twenty-five players attended this year's event at the historic Blennerhassett Hotel in downtown Parkersburg.

# Roush wins 1996 Charleston Chess Club Championship

John Roush with draws against Donald Griffith and Jim Walker clinched the 1996 Charleston Chess Club Championship. These were the only blemishes against his record. Of his two main competitors, Griffith suffered a loss to David Michael in the infamous "beeper" game and a draw with Chuck Waugh. Walker drew Gary Morris but lost to the "Walker-killer", Griffith. Michael finshed with 5 points to take fourth place outright.

### The Pioneers of the West Virginia Chess Association by Tom LaBue

Since I started competing in tournament chess in West Virginia, I've noticed (and a few others as well) that not a lot is known of the beginnings of the WVCA. Now that the archives have fallen into my lap, I wish to share some of the names that helped build the WVCA. Many of you should be familiar with names like Ed Foy, John Hurt and Dr. Siegfried Werthammer; however, we focus this month on four individuals who each contributed in his own way to the founding and furthering of the WVCA: Gene Collett, Dr. Vincent Hayward, Archibald (A. W) Paull, and Micajah Wren.

### Gene Collett

Walter Eugene Collett was born July 27, 1901 at Petroleum, WV (Ritchie County). Gene learned chess at age 16 from the book "The Major". However, he was not set totally straight on all the rules until Bill Devericks filled in the details. Bill and Gene founded the Clarksburg Chess Club in 1940. Gene was one of the forces that founded the West Virginia Chess Association back in 1941. He directed several WV State Championships including the 1941 event which was the first under the auspices of the WVCA. His best showing at the Championship was in 1948 where he finished a solo third, only a point behind the co-champions John Hurt and Dr. Werthammer. He served as the first bulletin editor from 1941 to 1948. Gene was also the secretary-treasurer of the WVCA until 1946.

Gene worked for the Clarksburg newspapers for eighteen years before transferring to Pittsburgh to become an Associated Press staffer in 1943. However, he continued to produce the Bulletin for several years after his relocation to Pittsburgh. At that time the WVCA Bulletin was a *monthly* publication and it continued to be so under his reign as editor. Gene, along with Pittsburgh's Bill Byland initiated the Tri-State Championship which pitted the winner and the first runner-up from the West Virginia, Pennsylvania and Ohio State Championships in a round-robin tournament. This event lasted from 1945 until 1962 with the site cycled among the three states.

Gene was a major source of information to the West Virginia Chess faithful, especially during the rough times of World War II, when many were engaged in the war effort. The bulletin related what was happening in each of the chess clubs, presented a problems page (edited by first by Walt Crede and then NY resident Francis

DeBlasio), letters from WVCA members (which were plentiful), and national chess news. There were not so many games in the bulletin due to the frequency of the bulletin and smaller number of events. It was not uncommon that the membership of the WVCA reached over 100 during this era, with many out-of-state members including GM George Koltanowski (still a member today!), Albert Pinkus, Dr. Albrecht Buschke of New York among others. Gene set the editorial standard for content and punctuality that the WVCA has not seen since.

### Dr. Vincent S. Hayward by Paul Sayre

The Doctor was known to chess players all over the state. He was a leading member of the Association for 13 years, and after retiring to New York (Long Island) was voted a life member for his many years of service. It could be said that Gene Collett founded the Association and gave it a start, A. W. Paull gave it leadership in the early life, and Dr. Hayward nursed it to a degree of maturity. He helped hold it together in lean times, when possible gave it a push forward, and when necessary lent material support. He served as WVCA president in the 1957-58 year and was editor of the Bulletin fron 1950 to 1957. He was a keen partisan, relishing the "politics" of the Association nearly as much as he did chess. He was an unequaled teacher of beginners.

During his years of service at the Veterans Administration in Huntington, he had occasion to deal with many veterans who were disabled. And many of them went away with a chess set which just happened to be lying around, and which the Doctor happened not to be using.

Among the things about which no kidding was allowed in the Doctor's presence were the flag, the uniform, and other patriotic symbols. He was a retired captain, having served as a physician, and was buried as he wished in the National Cemetery, as he wished, with military honors.

The saga of the Hayward wit needs a better Homer than this writer, but those who knew him can think of a number of examples. A potent weapon, it seemed to be directed (with just enough barb to make it stick, he said) now at hypocrisy, now at the modern cult of the casual in speech, manners, and dress, then at hazy thinking, and — neither last nor least— at obstructions in the path of chess. He was not above a joke on himself. When he dryly

referred to his spells as 'unsuccessful heart attacks', his friends had to smile, even though they felt a twinge. The man had courage.

Some of his pet expressions--which bring back fond memories of our chess sessions at the Haywards' home:

Slumps: Some weeks you can't make a nickel.
Boners: No game for a blind man.
Traps: The old ones are the best.
Black and White squares: Wet and dry squares.
Long queen move: Over the hot sand she goes.

While the Doctor loved his act--and even felt a certain obligation toward his public--anyone with common sense knew that it was only an act. That he was behind it all, kind, generous, and steadfastly loyal to his friends and convictions.

Addendum(TLB): It is mentioned in other issues that the rise in Huntington area chess in the 1950s with thenemerging stars like Don Burdick, Charles Morgan, Paul Sayre and Tom Bergquist, was greatly attributed to the efforts supplied by Drs. Hayward and Werthammer. They supplied chess instruction and materials to the interested youngsters. In fact, Dr. Hayward started the Huntington Junior Chess Club to cater to and develop the enthusiasm and talents of the younger chess players.

### Archibald (A. W.) Paull

Archibald W. Paull, "the Dean of the West Virginia Chess Players" was the first president of the WVCA when it formed in 1941. He served four consecutive terms as its leader until he voluntarily stepped down to allow others a chance to serve. He remained a big benefactor to the fledging WVCA with monetary contributions that kept the Bulletin on the presses during the lean years of the 1940s.

A. W. Paull was born November 23, 1869 at Wheeling, WV. He became president of the Wheeling Stamping Company, which was founded by his father in 1877. The firm employed about 750 persons with its products including oil lanterns and lamp burners, plastic caps for glass containers and collapsable tubes for Pepsodent, Listerine, and similar products (circa 1944).

He was taught chess by his father when he was 15 years old. A. W. was quick to downplay his chess ability. Witness the following quotes: "I have played in

tournaments in Pittsburgh, Zanesville and Parkersburg....; in each tournament, the title I received was that of 'worst player'". "I give knights, queens, rooks and bishops away with the prodigality equal to Republicans contributing to a campaign fund when the tariff is about to be lowered." A. W. finished 7th (out of 12) in the 1940 WV Championship in the only state event that he participated in.

### Micajah "Mike" Wren by Ed Foy

Mike's truly incredible career had its share of triumphs and failures. He had the most fertile imagination; a flair for words, a flair for chess--his hobby of hobbies. He did newspaper work and free-lance writing, wrote radio scripts, wrote for TV, worked for an advertising agency, did public relations work, wrote night club sketches for Josh White and a special FDR-death broadcast for Walter Hampden. CBS thought so highly of his "Battle of Gettysburg" script for the "You Were There" radio show that they issued a Columbia masterworks recording of it. Sure, he had other jobs, too, much more menial and less spectacular. And he played chess.

More than any one person, Wren was responsible for organized chess on the state level in West Virginia. He was the best player in Charleston in the early thirties and a match victory over Landis Marks gave him a strong claim to being the best player in the Mountaineer State.

Then he left Charleston for a quarter-century, returning a few years back. Mike won the state championship in 1959 brilliantly, with an amazing 6-0 score. He won the Charleston title in 1960.

Mike was one of the finest chess players ever to come out of this city or out of West Virginia. He knew how to win and lose with dignity and he would play anybody. Chess will not be the same without him.

Addendum: Mike Wren won the Charleston City Championship twice: 1932 (which was the inaugural tourney) and 1960. Mike was consistently known during the 40s as the "unofficial WV chess champion of the 30s", as a testament to his achievements over the board during that era.

# David Gundlach Crowned Parkersburg Club Champ

Competing in his first chess tournament in about twenty years, David Gundlach posted a perfect 7-0 score to sweep the field in the 1996 Parkersburg Chess Club Championship. "Crazy Dave", as he is affectionately known to his friends, demonstrated his masterful chess skills with extremely accurate play in the 8-player round robin event. Runners-up were Joe Ancrile and Bob McLear, each with 5½ points. The top three finishers received trophies for their efforts.

After the tournament, David testified that each one of his opponents seemed to battle extra hard against him. As a result, several earned nicknames like "Mad Dog" McLear and "Hulk' Haynes.

Two of David's games, which he annotated, are given here. They serve as highly instructive models of vigorous and uncompromising chess, trademarks for which David is well known. It should be noted, too, that David won numerous chess tournaments in the 1970's including the prestigious Cardinal open in Columbus and the Golden Triangle Open in Pittsburgh.

1. Nf3 d5 2. g3 c5 3. c4 d4 4. Bg2 Nc6 5. Apart from this, Black would face great obstacles to getting his pieces out on a timely basis. 12. Ne4 If White tries 12. Ob5, then 12... Nge7 13. Ne4 Nc8 (threatening 14, then N817) 14. Nc3 Bxc5 15. Qxc5 N8a7 (threatening to win the queen with 16...b6) 16. a4 Nb4 and White must sacrifice his knight and leave Black with a won game in order to rescue his queen. 12...Bd6 13. Bd2 Nge7 14. Rfc1 Since Black has almost completed his development and will likely play down the e and f-files. White decides to support his force on the

queenside and make his bid there before Black can generate an attack on the other wing. While this is certainly a reasonable plan, the placement of White's forces suggests he might do better to engage Black on the e and f-files with 14. Nh4 and a quick pown thrust to f4. 14...O-O 15. Qd1 Necessary before White can commence his action on the queenside because of Black's excellently posted rook at a6. 15...h6 This apparently quiet move signals that the Black kingside is about to surge forward. The g5 square will be unavailable to the White pieces, so the strong 16...f5 now looms large. White, despite his fine effort so far, will be forced to play very actively and carefully to avoid being overrun on the kingside. 16. Nxd6 Although this is consistent with White's plan to roll his queenside pawns before Black storms his king, his centralized knight is clearly too valuable to trade for Black's bad bishop. This also prevents White from continuing with his idea because of the threatened fork at c3. 22. Bd2 Ra2 The domination of the a-file becomes domination of the second rank, as well. 23. Rxa2 Rxa2 24. Qel Stopping the invasion of c3, but Black's position is already overwhelming. 24...Bf5 The initial move of a subtle maneuver that nets two tempi and, ultimately the game. 25. Rb3 More of less forced. If 25. Bf1 then White is reduced to utter passivity after Black plays g5 and invades either the queenside or kingside with his queen. 25...Nce7 Black supports his splendid knight at d5 against discovered attacks so that his queen is free to move away from support of that piece and engage White more fully elsewhere. 26. Nh4 Be6 27. Rb1 Necessary because of the potential discovered attack on the rook. 27...g5 28. Nf3 Bf5 Now the logic of Black's deployment is seen. then 29...Bg4 places White under extreme pressure. For instance, 30. Kg2? Bxf3+ 31. Kxf3 Qc6 32. Kg4 (32. Ke2?? Nc3++) 32...f5+ 33. Kh3 Ne3 34. Bxe3 g4+ 35. Kh4 Of6+36. Kh5 Of7+37. Kh4 Ng6+38. Kh5 Nf4+39. Kxh6 Qg6++ or 30. Be2 Qf5 31. Kg2 when either 31...Bxf3+ 32. Bxf3 Oxd3 or 31... Nc3 32. Bxc3 dxc3 should quickly deliver Black the full point. 29. Nxe5 Admittedly, this move was sheer desperation, but White was down to five minutes at this point. # WVU's Foray to the Intercollegiate Pan Am Championships by Jason Rihel

Despite playing without a fourth board, West Virginia University's chess team of Jason Rihel, Travis Martin, and Eric O'Brien managed to pull together 3 draws in 6 games at the Intercollegiate Pan Am Championships, held in Baltimore, Maryland on December 27-30. While a 1.5 out of 6 score may not seem like much, the team surrendered a forfeit loss each round, making the task of scoring a full point next to impossible. A newcomer to West Virginia chess, Nabil Feliachi, was expected to play board 2 for the Mountaineers, but his late university registration left him ineligible for the team competition. He did succeed in clinching the unrated title in the Open section with a draw against Wunderkind Mark Geist in the final round.

Despite the disappointment of playing a man down, the tournament was great fun. Some of the best players in the country showed up for this event, including the number 1 women in the US, WGM Anjelina Belakovskaya. WIM Anna Kahn and IM Valery Atlas were some of the other titled players. The pairing chart read as a who's who among college players, included players from the top 50 under 21 in the nation: #6 Michael Mulyar, #10 David Arnett, #27 Erez Klein, and #48 Adrian Keatinge-Clay. Add to this some players from the Open section, including Mark Geist and a computer rated at 2570, and one can see how the quality of chess was very high.

WVU put out some quality chess results as well. Yours truly got a very satisfying draw against Mike Mulyar in the first round, overcoming a 500 point rating gap in my first contest against a senior master. I finished 5-0-2 for the tournament, putting me in third place for board 1. Travis Martin and Eric O'Brien, despite finding themselves as two of the lowest rated players on boards 2 and 3, also came up with some key victories that launched WVU to three draws. # Sherrard JHS 9th Grade Team is National Runner-Up by Randy Bierce

Sherrard JHS Chess Club journeyed to Terre Haute, IN in search of answers to the questions buzzing in their young, inquisitive minds: Can we get into the Top 10? Could any of us be national Champion? Will anyone else from West Virginia be there? How much pizza do we get to eat tonight? Where's my clock?

The answers: Yes. No. Yes. Lots. It walked away. The Glanbard (IL) West HS edged out Sherrard JHS 9th graders for National Championship honors 101/2-10. After leading the tournament for the first three rounds, the Rams faltered in round 4, fell to third, then recovered in round 6 to nearly overtake Glenbard West. 33 schools from 12 states were represented. The remainder of the Top 5 9th Grade teams were Michigan City JHS - 3rd, Indianapolis Ritter - 4th, The Academy (Tampa, FL) - 5th.

Some of the better known teams had masters for analysis and herds of coaches, but Sherrard countered with 3time WV Champ, Andy Katz. -Andy drove the 7-hour trip Friday night and ground out 13 straight hours of between round analysis on Saturday. He also tirelessly put in 6 hours on Sunday, before departing for Charleston after the Award Ceremony. Scott Davis also helped between round, as did Randy Bierce. Two clocks were lost, then finally found to round out the weekend.

Sherrard's 7th grade team came out of 24th place in round 2 to finish 7th. 54 schools from 13 states were represented. SJHSCC 8th graders were 15th. 44 schools from 15 states competed in the 8th grade section. Limestone Elementary's 5th grade team finished 19th of 50 schools from 16 states. Hunter College Elementary of New York City was 5th grade National Champion.

Scott Davis of Elkins finished in a tie for 8th in the 12th grade section with 3½ points. Katie Cannon (E. Liverpool, OH) finished with 1.5 in the 7th Grade section. Team Malutich from Clarksburg were successful: Steven (4th) finished with 4 points; Michael (6th) ended with 3.5; John (10th) had 3. There were 19 players from WV. A total of 852 players participated in the 6-round event.
