Gikas wins Quick Chess, Saville the Blitz chess, Perks-Nicol Bughouse chess

An eventful few days on this weekend in late summer. More than sixty players made the trek to the Days Inn in Wheeling for the 1997 WV State Championship. With an assortment of activities there was action for everyone: the OTB tourney; the quick, blitz and bughouse championships; first weekend of Pro and college football; and great weather to take a swim in the hotel pool.

The action got underway Saturday afternoon, and all of the top seeds were victorious. However, the second round was a different story with some stunning upsets. Former WV Junior Champ Richard Sheppard (B) upended PA expert Ed Borden, Elkins' Walt Rueckert (C) defeated the already tenacious Mike Taylor. Mike Baker (B) obtained an early advantage over expert David Saville and was able to grind out a win in lengthy contest. We also had a match-up a two former champions already in Round 2 with Jim Gikas and Donald Griffith!

The Blitz tournament (5-minute) Championship was settled Saturday night. Twelve entrants battled in a 5 round tourney with two games against each player. Charleston expert David Saville outlasted the field, (Blitz tourney ended after 1am!) with a 9-1 score, the only blemish a loss to Randy Bierce. Randy was second at 8-2, his other loss to Weston's Byron Funkhouser. The show position went to NY expert Robert Feldstein finishing with 6½, however only splitting with Tom LaBue and ending ½-1½ against Ohio's new prodigy

Andy Nicol. Joe Lococo won the U1400 prize with a 6-4 mark.

Round three on Sunday morning saw more fireworks. Walt Rueckert was at it again crushing Randy Bierce. Walt sacked a piece and opened Randy's king to a swarm of pieces. His king survived but at the loss of material and position. Dave Olson upended Jim Walker in a game that teetered back and forth. (See game on p3). Jim Gikas was paired with another former champ, this time drawing with Andy Katz.

On Sunday night, the Bughouse Championship was contested for the first time in quite a few years. After five grueling rounds, the team of Grant Perks and Andy Nicol were the ones on the top of the heap with a 9-1 score. They were easily the best interactive team of the bunch. Surprisingly, the team of David Olson and Tom LaBue finished second with 8-2 only losing twice to Perks-Nicol. I had only played once before a few weeks prior and this was Dave's first time. We won our last four games: against Bierce-Abraham and Saville-Feldstein.

Later that evening was the WV Quick Chess tourney (10 minute). Even though it began late, a hearty crowd still was on hand. Jim Gikas is this year's Quick Chess

I consider it a privilege to have met so many new friends through these events. I hope that in the future, either by playing, or directing, I will have a chance to see all of you.

When Joe Ancrile, Pat Kelly, and I started running events four years ago in Parkersburg, there was not a lot of activity in the state. Now I can say without hesitation that West Virginia Chess has a very bright future, and I hope I am correct in saying that I did have a small part in building a foundation for that future.

My hope would be that Pat Kelly and others will continue to hold tournaments in Parkersburg, and you will continue to play in them whenever they are held. May God bless you in and your families in the future.

Notes from the Editor by Tom LaBue

Sorry for the delay in getting this issue to print. Mostly my time to work on the bulletin has been very limited because of an increased workload at the office. Also, I was waiting for State tourney data that never did arrive at my residence, but more on that later. I hope to have the next issue out in mid-February. Here's some info that I need to pass along. If you look to the left and see only one event planned for the next few months and are worried about the health of WV chess, read on. First, you will also find a letter which John Kay sent to me on the future of his TD duties. He had been hinting subtly about for the last year. This is the main reason for the lack of planned Parkersburg events. I would personally like to thank John for helping to kickstart WV Chess with the help of Joe Ancrile and Pat Kelly. We wish him the best in his next ministerial assignment and hope to run into him again in the future. He will be missed by all for his friendliness and ability to keep everything calm even when the circumstances didn't. Of course, the possibility of the 1998 U. S. Amateur South in WV is now almost zero.

I have talked with Pat briefly on this subject. Mike Baker and I have offered to help direct some events in Parkersburg if need be. We especially would like to see the 2-day Parkersburg Open in the spring continue. Look for events to start up again in 1998.

A more serious note to pass on: I have been informed by Ernie Schleck of the USCF that they have officially sent a complaint against Randy Bierce. A few complaints have been filed for various reasons: failure to submit tourney results in a timely fashion, failure to pay out prize money, etc. Most of the tourneys that Randy has held in the last year have not been rated, including the Limestone Invitational and the 1997 State Tourney. The prize money complaints also deal with the State event. Randy has claimed that he has sent in the results and that they have been lost by the USCF. To his credit, I cannot remember seeing so many crosstables in error in a year as in 1997. Ernie told me that they would like to settle the matter with seeing that all the tourneys get rated and the money distributed. If this occurs, Randy is likely only to receive only probation. If this matter is not cleared, there is a possibility that Randy's TD certification could be suspended. If this occurs, the site for the 1998 State Tourney could be in jeopardy. Stay tuned to the website and bulletin for more information on this story.

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1997 West Virginia Junior Champ - David Olson

The 1997 West Virginia Junior Champ, David Olson sent some of his games from the tourneys along with some annotations. The first game is his upset of Jim Walker, who eventually finished in a tie for first. Dave asked me if this had happened before, that a State Champion had lost a game. I knew it had, but had to check the records for the last few times. In 1989, Donald Griffith, John Roush and Alex Chang tied for first with a score of 4½. Griffith and Chang lost to Bob Bukovac and Roush had lost to Walker. Bukovac finished with a score of 4. In 1986, Pittsburgh expert Mark Eidemiller won the tourney for his second time, finishing at 5. Along the way he defeated Doug Lane, Andy Katz and Ed Garner, each of whom finished at 4½ and tied for the WV State Title. Pat Kelly also scored 4½, losing to Garner to take a share of the title in that St. Clairesville, OH event.

1997 State tourney summary (cont.)

Champ scoring 4½ out of 5. He was impressive throughout with successive victories against Marc Abraham, Donald Griffith and David Saville. He battled back in the final round to garner a draw with Randy Bierce to secure his title.

There were a large amount of players who had a chance to win the title here at the beginning of Round 5. Donald Griffith, Dave Olson, and Jon Karraker (B) all stood with 3½. John Roush was in a tough situation against Karraker, but survived after a positional blunder by Jon. Jim Gikas was beaten by the giant-killer Walt Rueckert. The position was very drawish, but Jim needed a win to stay in the chase for first and forced the issue with an piece sacrifice that proved to be unsound.

Minutes Annual Meeting August 30, 1997

The annual meeting of the West Virginia Chess Association was held on August 30, 1997 at Wheeling, West Virginia.

President Mike Baker called the meeting to order and asked Jim Meyer for his report on the USCF meeting at Orlando, Florida.

Nathan Gundlach - 1997 Parkersburg Club Champ

Twelve year old Nathan Gundlach swept the field, finishing 5-0 and capturing the 1997 Parkersburg Club Championship. Among the victims were Bob McLear and Joe Ancrile. Ancrile finished with a 4-1 score only losing to the Champion. The tourney was contested as a 5 round Swiss with one game per week played. Joe Ancrile was the TD for this affair. Not only did Nathan win the club championship (succeeding his father, Ohio expert David Gundlach, who won this event in 1996), but was selected by FM Chuck Schulien as having played the best game of the event. Here is that game against Mike Price played during Round 2.

Playing Thematic Chess

King's Indian Defense, Saemisch Attack

Best Game of tourney.

1. d4 Nf6 2. e4 g6 3. Nc3 Bg7 4. e4 O-O 5. f3 The obvious alternative 5. e5 leads to a sharp contest in which White often grabs all the space he can obtain with a broad, advanced center and Black, for his part, tries to undermine that center before White's king can get to safety. A game of this nature was contested between Rene Letelier and Bobby Fischer at the Leipzig Olympiad in 1960. The devastating nature of Black's victory led most players of the white pieces after that event to prefer less critical avenues, such as the one selected in this game. 5...d6 6. Be3 Nbd7 7. Bd3 c5 8. d5 Being slightly behind in development, it is logical that White should keep the position closed until he can catch up. Therefore 8. d5 is a very reasonable response to Black's strike at the center. Nonetheless, 8. N1e2, trying to restore the developmental balance as possible appears a little more accurate. 8...Ne5 9. Nge2 a6 Also good is 9...e6 with a Benoni-type formation. The text move essentially prevents White from following the automatic effort to assault Black's king by castling long and throwing kingside pawns. Black, with his magnificent, dark-squared bishop on g2 and a rook already stationed at a8, is well-placed to sacrifice a pawn at b5 to activate his pieces against a long-castled king's precarious position. 10. f4 Having played well to this point, White's impulsive choice is a serious error. His pawn at f3 supported his center, prevented encroachments by the active black knights, and provided the base for a possible

advancement of the g-pawn to g4 at a later point. White's greatest need at this time is to get his king to safety so he could begin his campaign against Black. With the text move, he emphasizes his own lagging development and offers Black a new square by which to penetrate the White position. 10...Nfg4 Right knight! 11. Bc1 Nxd3+ 12. Qxd3 b5 13. cxb5 What else? Yet, this capture does offer Black a fine-looking, Benko Gambit king of position. Black will be forced to play aggressively and accurately, but White is definitely going to have his hands full. 13...axb5 14. Qxb5 Although this move looks suspect, it may actually be the best among only difficult choices. Danger for White must lurk in such a situation. The alternative capture looks like trouble, too: 14. Nxb5 Ba6 15. a4 Qa5+ 16. Bd2 Bxb5 17. Qh3 Qc7 18. Qxg4 Bxa4 19. Nc3 Bc2 20. O-O Bd4+ 21. Kh1 Bxc3 22. bxc3 (22. Bxc3 Bxe4 23. Qg5 Qb7 24. Rad1 f6 25. Qg4 Bxd5 26. f5 Bb3 27. Rde1 Ra4 28. Rf4 Rxf4 29. Nxb5 rather than the text. 14...Ba6 This may well be the most accurate method of conducting the attack, but there is another plan that also appears to demonstrate the precarious nature of the position of the White king: 14... Bd4 15. Nxd4 cxd4 16. Ne2 Ba6 17. Qb4 Bxe2 18. Kxe2 d3+ 19. Kf3 Qd7 20. Qc3 Nf6 21. Qxd3 Ra4 22. Re1 Qg4+ 23. Kf2 Qh4+ 24. Kf1 Ng4 25. Be3 f5 26. h3 fxе4 27. Qe2 Nxe3+ 28. Qxe3 g5 29. b3 gxf4 30. The alternative (tying to force the game to go the way a player wants it to) is among the main reasons why chess games are lost.

A Significant Change to USCF Governance by Jim Meyer, WVCA Delegate

For several years now there has been a movement in USCF politics to change the way we elect our Policy Board (PB). This movement has usually been called One Man One Vote (OMOV) because it promotes direct election of the PB by all (adult) USCF members. Currently, only about 500 Delegates and Voting Members (DVMs) vote for PB candidates. Most of these electors are chosen by the various state chess organizations.

The main argument in favor of OMOV is self evident. It appeals to our democratic instincts. This is especially true if you believe the horror stories about the undemocratic way some DVMs are chosen. There is another side to the argument, of course. The increased number of voters means that being a serious candidate will be too expensive for most of us to ever consider. Administering such an election is likely to be quite expensive. There is also the fear that well-known but incompetent candidates would be elected. Bobby Fischer, for example, should have no trouble being elected but most of us would doubt his qualifications for being on the PB.

Partly as a reaction to OMOV and partly because it seems obvious that some changes must be made, a compromise system has been introduced by a Blue Ribbon Panel on Governance (BRP) appointed for the purpose two years ago. The recommendations of the BRP were approved, with some modification, by the delegates at the annual meeting in Orlando in August. The main effect of the compromise is to democratize the election of DVMs by requiring that they be elected by all adult USCF members in the state. Hence we will have OMOV in the election of DVMs but they will still elect the PB. Some other changes include:

- PB members will be elected at large and will elect their own officers,
- A system for recalling PB members will exist, and
- Regions and Regional Vice Presidents will be eliminated.

On the whole, governance questions are considered by most chess players to be real "yawners" but these changes are fairly revolutionary and promise to affect us all in one way or another.
