Parkersburg to Host 60th West Virginia State Championship Tournament

At a special meeting of the West Virginia Chess Association held before the Action Chess Championship, the membership voted to move the 1998 WV State Championship Tourney to Parkersburg. The meeting was often loud with strong feelings prevalent on both ends of the issue. Andy Katz tried to forge a compromise solution to keep the tourney in Wheeling with others directing, but many in attendance were not in a compromising mood. The minutes of this meeting can be found on pages 14-15.

The story begins with last year's WV State Championship, held in Wheeling over Labor Day weekend and directed by Randy Bierce. To this date, the event has not been received by USCF and not rated. Complaints were made that prizes, both money and trophies were not awarded. In addition, USCF received complaints that USCF membership dues were not passed along and that many of the tourneys that Randy had run during 1997 were never rated. We are also aware that some who joined WVCA at the end of the State Championship did not have their names or fees passed to the treasurer. With this situation hanging over the WVCA, the board decided to hold an open meeting of the association to discuss this problem. To complicate matters, at last year's business meeting, the membership voted to award the 1998 State tournament to Wheeling, with Randy Bierce to act as the organizer and director. No backup site was offered at the time.

Various members tried to contact Randy since last Labor Day and have had little success. John Roush talked to Randy in December and had arranged to meet, but this was eventually canceled. USCF representative Ernest Schlich tried repeatedly to contact Randy for more information on the accusations. He received one reply during this past winter with Randy saying that he would resend all pertinent materials, but nothing came from that discussion. To make sure that Randy was aware of the

WVCA meeting, a registered letter was sent by Tom Bergquist, to Randy and also to Andy Katz (Andy seemed to be the only one who had any luck finding Randy). The letter notified Randy of the meeting and its location.

In Randy's defense, he has done much to help this organization grow and survive in the last 15 years or so: Directing and organizing the State Championship many times (including the infamous St. Clairsville event in 1986), WVCA President and Bulletin editor. He had a few years as the WVCA Bulletin editor and put out a very entertaining and enjoyable publication. Recently, the growth of scholastic chess in the Wheeling area was due to Randy's efforts. Unfortunately, the problems over the past year have obscured all that he has done for the organization.

In mid-April, Emie Schlich informed me, after repeated unsuccessful attempts to contact Randy over the past six months, that the USCF regretfully decided to suspend the TD licence of Randy Bierce indefinitely. In order to for him to reclaim this privilege, he would have to address the complaints that the USCF received.

As a representative of the WVCA, I express my regret to those who were not awarded due prizes or didn't have their membership dues passed on. If you or someone you know, joined WVCA at one of these events and has not received any bulletins, send your name and address to myself or Tom Bergquist and we will put your name on the membership role. Also, Mike Baker is trying to put together a crosstable of game results from the 1997 State Tourney. At this point, we have only about half the results. This may be more for posterity's sake than anything else at this point. Again, please accept our apologies for any inconveniences or annoyances that this may have caused the WVCA membership.

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Playing Thematic Chess by David Gundlach

Nathan Gundlach (D) - Joe Ancrile (B) 1997 Parkersburg Club Championship 1. Nf3 f5 2. g3 Nf6 3. Bg2 e6 4. O-O d5 White 's noncommittal opening has encouraged Black to display his intended pawn structure. In this way, White will know how to play against it most effectively. 5. d3 Good move! It denies Black access to e4 and prepares to strike the Black center while activating the bishop at g2. It addresses this position more specifically and directly than does a move like 5. d4. 5...Be7 6. Nc3 Continuing to prepare the central break in a straight-forward manner. If now 6...d4, then White can play 7. Nb5 c5 (7...Nc6 8. c3 with Black's center under serious pressure while his king remains uncastled.) 8. Bf4 Na6 and both 9. c3 and 9. Ne5 look strong for White.

6...c6 With the dual purpose of reinforcing his pawn structure and preparing the thrust to d4 (since White's knight will no longer have the b5 square available). Nonetheless, 6...O-O would have been more flexible and safer. Also, possible was 6...c5 to prevent White's intended thrust to d4 by threatening d5-d4. This line might have gone something like: 6...c5 7. Bf4 Qb6 8. a4 Bd7 9. Ne5 Nc6 10. Nxd7 Kxd7 11. e4 d4 12. Nb5 e5 13. Bg5 a6 14. Na3 fxe4 15. Bxf6 Bxf6 16. Qg4+ Ke7 17. Nc4 Qc7 18. Qxe4 Rad8 or 7...Bd6 8. Bxd6 Qxd6 9. e4 fxe4 10. dxe4 Qb6 11. exd5 O-O with White fine either way.

7. e4 Very much to the point! White puts the Black center under pressure at the first opportunity. He does not allow Black the luxury of paying no price for the tempi he has used to solidify his center in preparation for action on the kingside (as is typical of the Dutch). An advantage in development is usually best demonstrated in an open position, so White begins the process of opening the position before Black can catch up in development. Sharp, thematic play from a boy whose thirteenth birthday occurred during this tournament!

7...fxe4 8. dxe4 dxe4 Black prefers to open the game and remove some material from the board than to be squeezed or to offer his opponent kingside attacking possibilities, yet his choice at this turn must be considered an error. Despite the difficulties associated with it, he needed to try: 8...O-O 9. e5 Ne8 (9...Nfd7 10. Bh3 which looks very strong for White in conjunction with a deployment of his knight to d4.) 10. h4 c5 11. Bf4 Nc6 12. Qe2 with a complicated fight on the horizon.

9. Qxd8+ Bxd8 10. Ng5 O-O 11. Ngxe4 White's superior development and Black's isolated pawn provide White with a distinctly superior game. Black will have his hands full if he is to keep White's advantage from growing larger.

11...e5 Although it is understandable that Black would want to get his c8 bishop off the back rank, the positional problems have obscured his most effective lines of play. Both 11...Bc7 and 11...Nd5 look better than the text.

12. Nd6 Although this move looks good, it was probably better to stress his advantage in development by 12. Be3 instead of moving his knight yet another time. This improvement would emphasize White's lead in development and excellent piece coordination.

12...Nbd7 Rather than smothering his bishop on c8, Black might have tried 12... Bc7 13. Nxc8 Rxc8. White is still superior, but the reduced immediate pressure on Black might offer him hope to hold the game, especially against a player much less experienced than himself.

13. Bh3 Pointedly putting his finger on the weaknesses along the h3-c8 diagonal.

13...Bb6 A more effective way of relieving the bind would have been 13...Nb6 when White can choose between the encouraging options of 14. Nxc8 Nxc8 15. Be6+ Kh8 and White has two fine bishops in addition to his other advantages or 14. Bxc8 Nxc8 15. Nxb7 when, with a little care, he can hold the extra pawn and leave Black saddled with three isolani.

14. Be6+ Kh8 15. Nf7+ Despite appearances, this is probably not right. The most accurate line likely begins with 15. Rd1 and could continue with something like: 15... Bd4 16. Nf7+ Rxf7 17. Bxf7 Nf8 18. Be3 Bg4 19. Re1 Bxc3 20. bxc3 N8d7 21. f4 Ne4 22. Bb3 exf4 23. Bxf4 Nxc3 24. Kg2 Ne2 25. Bd6 Nd4 26. Re7 Rd8 27. Rael Nf6 28. Bb4 Bf3+ 29. Kf2 Bd5 30. Rd1 Ng4+ 31. Kg1 Nf3+ 32. Kf1 Nfxh2+ 33. Ke1 Nf3+ 34. Ke2 Nfe5 35. Bxd5 cxd5 36. Rxd5 Rc8 37. Bc3 with an exciting game that White is winning in spite of the complications. If entering such a complex and dangerous variation seems unnecessarily precarious a course to follow, then White could choose the simple, prudent move 15. Na4 at this turn to challenge Black's most effective piece, his bishop at b6. White would still retain many favorable options while restricting Black's hopes for active counterplay, although he would not enjoy the immediate gain of material available in the 15. Rd1 line. From a practical perspective in a critical game, 15. Na4 has

much to recommend it, however.

- 15...Kg8 Rather than submitting to further harassment of the king, the best chance likely lay in giving up the exchange to gain activity for the remaining pieces. The variation might run something like: 15...Rxf7 16. Bxf7 e4 17. Bf4 Nc5 and there still is a lot of chess to be played.
- 16. Nxe5+ Kh8 17. Nf7+ Although it looks like a perfectly logical move, this is not correct and allows Black unwarranted counterplay if he responds sharply. Having pocketed the pawn it is now time for White to prevent Black from gaining such counterplay. A better choice might be 17. Nd3 to be followed by the deployment of his dark-squared bishop.
- 17...Kg8 Much more responsive to the requirements of the position is 17...Rxf7 18. Bxf7 Ne5 19. Bb3 Bh3 20. Bf4 Nf3+ 21. Kh1 Re8 22. Bf7 Re7 23. Bc4 Bxf1 24. Rxf1 or something similar.
- 18. Nd6+ Kh8 19. Nxc8 An unfortunate error after so much hard work. This knight has innumerable tempi invested in it and occupies one of the best squares on the board. Nothing is even threatening it, so the idea of trading it should be given nothing more than a cursory examination. Much more to the point would be: 19. Be3 to trade White's undeveloped bishop for Black's aggressively-posted one. Development often takes precedence over the creation of immediate threats when the practical demands of a tournament game are weighed in the equation. Also possible, and the most accurate choice is 19. Rd1. This variation might run: 19...Ba5 20. Nxc8 Nc5 21. Bh3 Bxc3 22. bxc3 Raxc8 23. Bxc8 Rxc8 24. Be3 Na4 25. Bd4 Ne4 26. Bxa7 Nexc3 27. Rd3 Re8 28. Kf1 h6 29. Bd4 Nb5 30. Re1 Ra8 31. Ba1 Nc5 32. Rde3 Ra4 33. Re7 Nd4 34. f4 and, with a little care still required, White is clearly winning.
- 19...Raxc8 20. Na4 Although this move challenges Black's currently most effective piece, it would be stronger for White to develop the last of his pieces with 20. Bf4 and quick placement of his rook at al to either the d-file or e-file (as the circumstances require at that point).
- 20...Rce8 A well considered response that offers Black his best chance to hold the game/ A lead in development often provides full compensation (or more) for a small material deficit. White still holds an advantage in this specific instance, but Black is trying hard to make a fight of it.

- 21. Bb3 This retreat has the merit of retaining a fine bishop, but it loses just a little more time when time has become a valuable commodity. It was probably more accurate to play something along the lines of: 21. Nxb6 Rxe6 22. Nxd7 Nxd7 23. Be3 b6 24. Rad1 Nf6 25. Rfe1 c5.
- 21...Ba5 22. Be3 a6 It would be better to deny White access to the c5 square. Necessary was 22...b6 23. Rad1 Ne5 24. Kg2 N6g4 25. Bf4 Bb4 26. Nc3 Nxc3 27. bxc3 with many moves still to be played in this game.

 23. Nc5 Bb6 Necessary was the bitter 23...Rb8 24. Nxd7 Nxd7 25. Rad1 Nf6 26. f3 Rfe8 27. Kf2 b5 when the game is clarifying itself to White's significant advantage. If instead, 23... Rxe3 because the knight at c5 is loose, then 24. Nxd7 leaves both rooks en prise and forces Black to lose material.
- 24. Ne6 With this intrusion, the overwhelming nature of White's advantage is apparent. Black must drop more material, and White has overcome his previous disadvantage in development.
- 24...Rg8 In a losing position, Black tries to complicate matters, but this only makes the situation worse. Absolutely required was 24...Bxe3, although after 25. Nxf8 Bxf2+ 26. Rxf2 Nxf8 27. Rfd2 it's time to go get a cup of coffee (or herb tea for the purists).
- 25. Bxb6 Nxb6 26. Ng5 Rgf8 27. Nf7+ Kg8 Still trying to keep matters complicated, but this is a luxury that can no longer be afforded. Better, but still lost for Black, was simply 27...Rxf7 28. Bxf7 Re7 29. Bb3 c5 30. c3 c4 31. Bd1 Kg8 32. Bf3.
- 28. Nd6+ Kh8 29. Nxe8 Rxe8 30. Rae1 Rd8 31. Re7 Rd7 32. Rfe1 h6 33. Rxd7 Nbxd7 34. Re7 b6 35. Be6 Nc5 36. f3 Kh7 37. b4 Although 37. Bf5+ appears slightly better, White's solution can hardly be faulted since it brings immediate and unstoppable victory. 37...Na4 38. Ra7 Black resigns

Despite the imperfections in this stressful game that played such a crucial role in determining the winner of the event, this was a remarkable performance by one of the area's top young players against a seasoned and respected warhorse. (By the way, since the loser of this game and the author of the annotations are the same age, I would like to point out that Mr. Ancrile is not really very old at all. Like a fine wine, he is just reaching his prime).

Newcomer Yuri Kolkin takes Cross Lanes Open title by John Roush

Twenty-six players attended the Cross Lanes Open at the Lake Chaweva Clubhouse on January 31, 1998. The winner with a perfect score was Yuri Kolkin. Mr. Kolkin is currently residing in Huntington, WV, although he emmigrated from Russia in the not too distant past. Only seeded 5th on the charts with a rating of 1936, he played with the skill and determination for which his countryman are noted and brought home top honors and \$90.

David Saville of Charleston captured second and \$60 with a near perfect score of $3\frac{1}{2}$ -\foralle_2. Jerry Skeen (South Charleston) and Markle Butcher (Buckhannon) split the \$40 prize for top A/B. Scott Davis of Randolph County secured the \$40 prize for top C and Jim Olson won the \$40 prize for top D.

Young Stephen Malutich captured the \$40 under 1200 prize and the upset prize (Informant #66) for his second round win over Markle Butcher. David Saville threw in two free Chess lessons at Taylor's Books to sweeten the pot! Stev is ten years old and attends Harden Elementary School. He has played chess about three to four years and has already registered the following impressive results:

- 11th in K-5 at Nationals in NJ
- 2nd in K-6 at 1997 WV Scholastic
- 1st U1200 at 1997 Amateur South

Steve enjoys playing the trumpet and wants to be a lawyer, someday!? (It appears yours truly will have to beware of Steve on two fronts!) Steve's big brother John, also had quite a tournament scoring $2\frac{1}{2}$ - $1\frac{1}{2}$ and picking up 60 rating points.

Unfortunately many of the key games were decided with flags hanging, pieces flying, and scoresheets neglected. Here is a selection of decipherable ones.

Jim Walker (X) - David Hundley (D), Round 1 King's Gambit

1. e4 e5 2. f4 exf4 3. Nf3 Be7 4. Bc4 Nh6?! 4...Nf6 5. e5 Nh5 is more natural. 5. O-O c6 6. Nc3 d6 7. d4 g5 8. h4 Bg4 The placement of the knight at h6 prevents Black from essaying 8...g5 as 9. Bxf4 hits the undefended knight. 9. hxg5 Bxg5 10. Qd3 f6?! 11. Nh2 Nd7 12. Bxf4 Qc7? 12...Qe7 is better as it permits the bishop to retreat to e6. 13. Bxg5 fxg5 14. Qg3 Netting a

piece and, effectively the game. 14...O-O-O 15. Nxg4 Nxg4 16. Qxg4 h6 17. Rf7 Qb6 18. Bb3 Qxd4+ 19. Kh1 Rhf8 20. Raf1 Kb8 21. Rxf8 Nxf8 22. Qf5 Nd7 23. Qe6 Nc5 24. Qe7 Rd7 25. Qe8+ Kc7 26. Be6 Rg7 27. Rf7+ Rxf7 28. Qxf7+ Kb6 and White won.

Jim Olson (D) - Markle Butcher (B), Round 1
Torre Attack

1. d4 Nf6 2. Nf3 e6 3. Bg5 Be7 4. Nbd2 d5 5. e3 O-O 6. Bd3 Nbd7 7. c3 c5 8. Ne5 Nxe5 9. dxe5 Nd7 10. Bxe7 Oxe7 11. f4 c4!? This yields the d4-square, but threatens Nc5-d3. While, I can't condemn this idea out of hand, I prefer the immediate 11...f6!? After 12. exf6 (12. Oh5 g6 13. Bxg6!? hxg6 14. Qxg6+ Qg7 doesn't look quite sound) 12...Nxf6 13. O-O e5!? or 13. e4!? e5 with counterplay in either case. 12. Bc2 b5!? Adding another idea (queenside pawnstorm) to the mix. Of course, Nc5-d3 is still playable. 13. O-O Bb7?! The bishop should only get in the way on this square. Black should continue with ...a5 or ...Nc5 and ultimately tuck the bishop away at d7 where it guards e6 (White will probably play f5 at some point) and open a route to the queenside for the KR.. 14. Nf3 f6!? Switching back to the kingside makes 12...b5 somewhat meaningless. 15. exf6 gxf6!? Bold and best in this position. 16. Nd4 f5?! 16.. a6 17. Oh5 f5! If instead, 17. f5!? e5!? 18. WVCA Special Business Meeting Minutes

March 28, 1998

Lake Chaweva Clubhouse, Cross Lanes, WV

Purpose - Possible change of location and sponsorship of the 1998 West Virginia State Championship Tournaments and regular business meeting over the Labor Day holiday.

Board of Directors present:

Jonette Mercer - Vice-President Tom Bergquist - Secretary-Treasurer Tom LaBue - WVCA Bulletin Editor

Members present: 24

Jonette Mercer, Vice-President called the meeting to order and called for discussion of the issue at hand.

DISCUSSION:

Tom LaBue opened by relating his contact with Ernie Schlich, Technical Director of the United States Chess Federation. Mr. Schlich stated that he had never received the results of the 1997 West Virginia Championship Tourney held over the Labor Day weekend. Mr. Schlich had mailed several requests to Randy Bierce for the tournament results and was finally contacted by Randy who told him that they had been sent and must have been lost in the mail. Tom LaBue has not been able to contact Randy; the last time he talked with Randy was at the 1997 State Tourney and that Randy said he would Tom the games for inclusion to the bulletin. Mr. Schlich further stated that unless the matter is resolved, USCF will withdraw Randy's right to direct tournaments that are to be recognized and rated by the USCF. Tom also stated that Mr. Schlich would notify all concerned of their final decision on Randy.

John Roush discussed the possibility of reconstructing the results of the 1997 State Championship Tournament so that it could be rated by the USCF and the results published in the bulletin. John also stated that he and Donald Griffith did not receive their prize money of \$100 each from Randy.

Tom LaBue states the Randy Bierce has failed to make timely notification to the USCF of the West Virginia Championship Tournament that he, Randy is to sponsor and direct in Wheeling, WV over the 1998 Labor Day Weekend. This notification is required by both the WVCA Constitution, and USCF for publication in Chess Life and notification to USCF of an upcoming event to be rated by USCF.

Andy Katz questioned the authority of the Board of Directors to condict a meeting to cancel the WVCA's acceptance at its 1997 business meeting of Randy's offer to sponsor and direct the 1998 West Virginia State Championship Tournament. He also brought up the legal aspects of WVCA's right to cancel the acceptance and the possibility of a split of organized chess in West Virginia into two factions. He stated that he had talked to Randy om Friday, March 27, 1998 and proposed a three part solution in dealing with Randy:

- 1. Randy Bierce will sponsor the 1998 WV State Championship Tournament.
- 2. Randy Bierce will hire or engage a director to direct the tournament.
- 3. That a third person will be designated to hold all funds collected at and prepaid for the tournament, tournament entry fees and membership fees for the WVCA and USCF. All funds will be paid out by this third person, USCF membership fees to USCF, WVCA membership fees to WVCA and prize funds to the winners of the tournament.

Andy states that Randy can act legally under the authority granted to him at the 1997 business meeting by the WVCA that he can hold the 1998 State Championship Tournament in the Wheeling area and possibly obligate WVCA for site rental and other expenses. Andy continues to offer te Wheeling area as the site of the WVCA State Championship Tournament.

WVCA Special Business Meeting Minutes

John Kay stated that he and Pat Kelly foresaw possible difficulties with the 1998 State Championship Tournament being held in the Wheeling area and prepared to offer the Parkersburg area as an alternate site.

MOTION BY JOHN KAY

Does the WVCA membership acknowledge that it has a binding agreement with Randy Bierce to hold the WVCA State Championship Tournament in the Wheeling area over the 1998 Labor Day Weekend?

Andy Katz offers an amendment to phrase the motion in positive terms. This is accepted by John Kay sho so moves. The motion now reads: The WVCA membership has a binding agreemant with Randy Bierce that he hold the 1998 State ChampionshipTournament in the Wheeling area over the Labor Day weekend.

Andy Katz seconds the motion.

Vice President Jonette Mercer calls for a vote by a show of hands.

For: 2

Against: 7

Motion fails. The West Virginia Chess Association no longer has an agreement with Randy Bierce to hold the 1998 State Championship Tournament over the Labor Day Weekend.

DISCUSSION:

Andy Katz offered to ask Randy to withdraw his bid.

John Roush said we should notify USCF and all other concerned and interested parties of our decisions here.

MOTION BY DONALD GRIFFITH:

That WVCA cancel its acceptance of Randy Bierce as sponsor and tournament director of its 1998 State Championship Tournament, and that, the WVCA accept John Kay and Pat Kelly's offer to hold and direct the 1998 WVCA State Championship Tournament over the Labor Day weekend in the Parkersburg area.

John Roush seconded the motion.

Vice President Jonette Mercer called for a vote by show of hands:

Griffith, Walker share the 1998 WV Action title

Twenty-one souls dared to enter the 1998 West Virginia Action Championship, held at the Lake Chaweva Clubhouse and hosted by the Charleston Chess Club. This was the first time that the event was held as a standalone event. Seven rounds is a lot of chess to play in one day. Jim Walker and Donald Griffith shared first place and the championship by finishing with 6-1 scores. Donald winning five and drawing contests in rounds three and four to Walker and John Roush, respectively. Jim and John drew in Round 5. John's loss to Sefus Ellis in the sixth round took him out of running. Huntington expert, Mark Hathaway suffer consecutive losses to Walker and Markle Butcher that kept him off the leader board.

There was some excitement in the final round. Donald had already beaten Byron Funkhouser and was in the clubhouse with his 6.
