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Charleston to Host 1999 U.S. Amateur South and the 1999 West Virginia Action Chess Championship

Charleston, WV will be the site of plenty of chess excitement this year, starting with the 1999 West Virginia Action Chess Championship scheduled for March 27 and continuing with the 1999 US Amateur South over Memorial Day weekend.

First, the Action Tournament is a seven-round Swiss event to be held at Taylor Books on March 27. Time Control is G/30, the "K" value will be ½ - which means each game will only have half the weight on your rating. Jim Walker and Donald Griffith are the defending champions. WV residents must be a WVCA member to participate. Out of state players are welcome to participate. For more info, see the events page.

We're Back: The 1999 US Amateur South Returns to Charleston!

Ohio Chess Projects is proud to announce that the 1999 U.S. Amateur South will again be held in Charleston, West Virginia. For the third year, the Southern Regional of the nationwide tournament will be in the Mountain State. The tournament dates are May 29-30, the first two days of the Memorial Day holiday weekend. There will be more prizes this year, a great new site, in short, a tournament experience worth participating in!

The tournament has much the same format as previous years; a five Round Swiss System event split into two sections: the Championship section open to players rated 2199 and under, and the Reserve section for players rated 1799 and below. The time limit will be the same as last year, Game in 135 minutes. The same low Entry Fees are in place for this year as well, scholastic entries at

\$15pre/\$25 at site, and other players \$25/\$35. Taylor Books will again be selling equipment at the tournament, Senior Master Bob Bukovac will be doing game analysis this year, and NTD Jim Meyer will be the chief tournament director.

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This year, we have moved the tournament site from the Charleston Mariott Town Center just down Lee Street to the new Embassy Suites Hotel, at the corner of Lee and Court Streets. There is more space for the tournament, and more analysis areas at the Suites. It is still just across the street from the great Town Center Mall, and closer the attractions of downtown Charleston. While the hotel room rate is higher this year than last year, \$89 flat (1-4 per room), the Hotel has a free evening Manager's Reception and free cooked to order breakfast in the morning. In short, you get at least two meals and a sleeping room for \$89! You will also enjoy a high quality room to sleep and relax in, with all the amenities of a great hotel! For a national tournament, you cannot find a better value.

Besides the great new site, players in the Reserve Section will also have a new reason to participate in the tournament. There are plans in the works to have the Regional Reserve Section champions participate in an ICC playoff, just like the Championship Section winners do each year. If the plans come to fruition, two regional participants will be trying to win a national Championship!

Joe Ancrile - Undefeated 1998 Parkersburg Club Champion

Joe Ancrile won the 1998 Parkersburg Chess Club Championship with a perfect score of 8-0. Nathan Gundlach, last year's winner, finished at 7-1 to claim the runner-up spot. Joe and Nathan received trophies for their efforts The round robin tournament attracted nine area players and was played on Wednesday evenings at the Vienna Public Library and Tebay Dairy Co. Time control was G/100.

Club Championship

1. e4 c5 2. Nf3 Nc6 3. c3 e6 Although this is a reasonable move, it is not quite precise. White's preparation to build a pawn center denies him the option of quickly developing his queen knight to c3. Both 3...d5 and Nf6 direct their attention to this deficiency without delay and demand more from White than the text does. 4. d4 d5 Slightly better might be: 4...cxd4 5.cxd4 Nf6 6.Nc3 d5 7.e5 Ne4 and Black enjoys a very comfortable French Defense. 5. e5 This leads to a well-known position with play for both sides. Still, I would prefer 5.dxc5 to keep the center open and create an isolated pawn to work against. 5... Nge7 6. Bg5 This move rightly tries to restrict Black's options and avoids the pitfall, 6.dxc5 Ng6, after which White's game becomes very difficult. Nonetheless, this bishop does not belong on g5. and the king bishop should be developed first. To move this piece at this point just produces unnecessary queenside weaknesses. 6...h6 Offering White the option of retreating to the center or queenside to reinforce the weaknesses caused by his premature sortie, this cannot be perfectly accurate. White might also trade his bad bishop for the knight on e7 since, in closed positions, bishops tend to be less effective than knights. Preferable for Black would be the immediate 6...Qb6, touching the weak point at b2. If White tries to defend by 7.Qb3, simply 7...Oxb3 8.axb3 cxd4 and Black enjoys a lasting pull.

7. Bh4 White needs to react as in the previous note. After losing this tempo and restricting his dark-squared bishop to kingside action, his deficiencies on the queenside become much more evident. 7...Qb6 Right! Black's pressure on the dark squares through the center and on the queenside guarantee him the initiative and the advantage. 8. b3 This just increases White's liabilities

on the dark squares. Since 8.Qb3 would also favor Black too much, it is probably mandatory to play 8.Bxe7 Bxe7 9.Qd2 and White, though still behind, has consolidated to a less critical situation. 8...cxd4 9. cxd4 Necessary is 9.Bxe7. 9...Nf5 Black is fully won at this point, 10. Nc3 Nxh4 11. Nxh4 Nxd4 While this move definitely wins, my own choice is to forget the pawn and emphasize the dark-square weaknesses and the difference in potential development with 11...Bb4 12.Rc1 Bd7 13.Nf3 Rc8 14.Qd2 Qa5 and White is already at the cliff's edge. 12. Nf3 Bb4 Right! This works tactically and emphasizes White's weak dark squares while developing a piece. 13. Od2 Nxf3+ 14. gxf3 d4 15. Bb5+ An enterprising try, typical of Darth's creativity and courage! 15...Kf8 Good! White's king bishop is left in jeopardy. If 15...Ke7. then 16.Nd5+! exd5 17.Qxb4+ Ke6 18.f4 and White is back in the game since Black's king is now exposed to attack. Although 15.....Bd7 appears to work tactically, it would not leave the White bishop as a target and would place Black's king in the center of the board. 16. O-O-O Bxc3 17. Qd3 Qa5 Inexorably pursuing those dark-square deficiencies. Both 17...Qc5 and 17...a6 also win. 18. Ba4 Qb4 Both the text and 18...Bd7 19.Qe4 (or Qc4) Rc8 lead to rapid victory because of the inescapable onslaught upon White's king. 19. Kc2 Oa3 20. Ob5 Ke7 21. Kd3 Rd8 22. Oc4 Bd7 23. Oc7 Rac8 24. Oxb7 Ba5 25. Oxa7 Rc3+ 26. Ke4 Ob2 27. Bb5 Oxf2 28. Rhf1 All roads lead to Rome. If 28.Rd3, then 28...Qe2+29.Kf4

This hard-fought game is a clear demonstration of the combativeness and insight that have become typical of Parkersburg's young chess gladiators. Darth's vigorously resourceful play was clearly in evidence. It is no wonder that he took 4 1/2 of his first 5 points! While not perfect, Black's strategic conception and tactics were sharp and to the point. Simply stated, he played well. Overall, this was an outstanding effort by both sides. As I mentioned to Darth at the conclusion of the game, his loss could not be considered his fault since my son had the advantage of "the dark side." (The martial strains of Darth Vader's identifying song are playing in the background as you read this.)

I haven't done this in a while, but time to browse through the archives of the West Virginia Chess Bulletin to take a peek at the chess activities 10, 25, and even 50 years ago.

Three-Way Tie In Carbide Club Tourney (from March, 1949, #78) Editor: Gene Collett
The Carbide Club tournament in South Charleston, proceeding in a leisurely way with a game every two weeks, was in a three-way tie between Dr. J. S. Blagg, Al DuVall and Harold Liggett, each with a score of 2-0 at the end of February.

It is a six-round Swiss System event, with Al DuVall defending his Championship. Dr, Blagg has wins over Bruce Marples and Kingsley Hughes, DuVall over Jim Ankeney and Bob Swarbrick, and Liggett over J. Schilling and Bill Hartling.

Fourth place was a tie between Arthur Maloy and Ray Martin, each with 1½-½. They drew each other. Maloy won from David Marples and Martin won from Strasser.

The next seven players also were tied with scores of 1-1 each. They are Greenley, Dick Grimm, Bill Hartling, Kingsley Hughes, Bruce Marples, David Marples, and Bob Swarbrick. The remaining four players, Ankeney, Schilling, Semeral and Strasser have yet to win a game.

Bill Salmon moved that the minutes be approved as corrected. Dave Olson seconded the motion, which was than approved.

The minutes of the special meeting on March, 28, 1997 were read. Bill Salmon moved that they be approved as read. After second by Dave Olson, the motion passed.

The financial statement for the fiscal year September 1, 1997 to August 31, 1998 was read and was also approved after motion by David Saville and second by Chuck Waugh.

Ra2 Rh6 49. e6 Rxh4 50. Drawn Each side will have to sac his rook to prevent the pawn from queening.

Annotations by Bob Bukovac

Griffith,D (2080) - Cummings,G (1870) [B96] Charleston Chess Club Championship (7) 1998 Notes by Bob Bukovac

This game features some razor-sharp play right from the start. The survey of alternative possibilities up to where the game leaves known paths will be only a brief orientation since anything more would lead us too far afield. Nunn's works on this variation are among the best available and are recommended if the reader wants more detail.

1. e4 c5 2. Nf3 d6 3. d4 cxd4 4. Nxd4 Nf6 5. Nc3 a6 6. Bg5

This was the rage back in the 1970s when these players were among the contenders of Charleston chess. 6. Be3 is 'en vogue' today. 6...Ng4 7. Bg5 h6 8. Bh4 g5 9. Bg3 Bg7 10. Be2 h5 11. Bxg4 hxg4!? This is the latest critical example from top-flight play, Shirov-Kasparov, Wijk aan Zee 1999 (0-1, 49).

6...e6 7. f4 Nbd7

A lesser known try in this position. 7...Be7 is the workhorse of this variation. 8. Qf3 Qc7 9. 0-0-0 Nbd7 10. Bxf6 Nxf6 11. g4 b5 12. g5 Nd7 13. f5 Nc5 14. f6 gxf6 15. gxf6 Bf8 16. Rg1 has been the main try since

the middle 1980s; 7...Qb6 is the strategically consequent Poisoned Pawn variation. 8. Qd2 Qxb2 9. Rb1 Qa3 10. f5 (10. e5; 10. Be2; 10. Bxf6); 7...Nc6 has been tried by Browne in recent years. 8. Nxc6 bxc6 9. e5 h6.

8. Qf3 Qc7 9. 0-0-0 b5 10. Bxb5

The sharpest reply to Black's audacious try. 10. e5 Bb7 11. Qh3 is the other sharp continuation, which has been tried more often in GM play. 11...dxe5 12. Nxe6 fxe6 13. Qxe6+ Be7 14. Bxf6 (14. Bxb5; 14. Nxb5); 10. Bd3 is the least flagrant of the bunch, however... 10...Bb7 11. Rhe1 Qb6 12. Nd5 is critical and not without its complications.

10...axb5 11. Ndxb5

11. e5 is also possible. One difference is that compared to the move played it cuts across the possibility of Ra8-a5 in some lines but allows the additional Qc7-c8 in others.

11...Qb8

11...Qb6 is comparatively rare, but certainly comes into consideration.

12. e5 Bb7

12...Ra5!? 13. exf6 gxf6 14. Bh6 (14. Bh4 Rxb5 15. Nxb5 Qxb5 is considered hopeless for White by Nunn. If the position does not seem so to the reader I will merely add that from a theoretical point of view a world-class GM is not going to go down a risky line like this in order to back out now and leave himself with no real attacking chances and leave his opponent with a compact center and three nice minor pieces. So white presses on instead.) 14...Bxh6 15. Nxd6+ Ke7 16. Kb1 (16. Rhe1).

13. Qe2 dxe5

13...Be7 is also known, but perhaps black is not yet facing enough danger that he must resort to this 'out'.

14. fxe5

A new try. 14. Qc4 Be7 (14...Bc5 allows a strong attack by 15. Bxf6 gxf6 16. Rxd7! Be3+ 17. Kb1 Kxd7 18. Rd1+) 15. Nc7+ Kf8 16. Rxd7 Nxd7 17. Rd1 Bxg5 18. fxg5 Bc8 19. N3b5!

14...Nd5

14...Qxe5 might be a simple way to pull teeth since 15. Qd2 (15. Qxe5 Nxe5 16. Nc7+ Ke7 17. Nxa8 Bxa8) 15...Bb4 16. Rhe1 Bxc3 does not offer white real attacking chances.
