#### U.S. Amateur South Returns to Charleston for the third year

For the third consecutive year, Charleston, WV will be the host city of a National Chess Event, the 1999 United States Amateur Championship, South Regional. The USAS will be held at the new Embassy Suites Hotel in Charleston over Memorial Day weekend, Saturday and Sunday, May 29-30.

The Embassy Suites is just a block down the street from the Marriott Town Center, where this event was held the last two years. The tournament rooms are supposed to be a little more spacious than those at the Marriott. The hotel room rate is good for up to four people and includes a free dinner reception on Saturday and full breakfast on Sunday morning.

For those unfamiliar with this event, it is open for all chess players rated under 2200. There will be two sections contested, Open and Reserve (U1800). The winner of each section will advance to a National Playoff with the winners of the other regionals (East (NI), North (MI), and West (AZ)). These playoffs will be conducted on the Internet at Internet Chess Club (ICC) during the month of June.

The prior winners of the Open Section of the USAS held in Charleston were John Roush as he edged TN's Leonard Dickerson in 1997 and William Surlow, who defeated Russ Wilson in a playoff last year. The Reserve winners were Robert Canary (1997) and Scott Carmichael (1998).

There will be plenty of prizes to be awarded during this two day event. In each section, trophies will be awarded to the top SIX players, also to top Senior (over 55), Junior (under 21), Scholastic (under 18), Under 13 and Upset Prize. In the Open Section, class trophies will be given to the top 4 in Classes A, B, and C and below. In the Reserve Section, trophies to top 4 in classes C, D, E,

and Under 1000. Also to be awarded this year, are prizes for Best Game, Best Performance Rating, Longest Distance Traveled, Longest Distance Driven. There is also a quick chess event scheduled for Friday night.

The tourney organizer is the Rev. John Kay and the Tournament Director is NTD Jim Meyer. This is the same tandem that has run the last two events which have gone smoothly.

# Parkersburg's David Hickman is Crowned the 1999 WV High School Champion; Jefferson County HS secures the High School Team Trophy

The 1999 West Virginia Scholastic Championships were once again contested at WV State College after a year in Morgantown. A total of 133 students competed in this tournament, which has been held since 1971.

The High School section saw a mild upset - David Hickman of Parkersburg. David beat the top two seeds: 8th grader Michael Malutich an his brother John (last year's co-champion.), a senior at Liberty HS. The other co-champion from last year, Marc Abraham did not participate in this year's event. David's only blemish was a final round draw to Joe Meadows. Others making the All-State Team were: Michael Malutich, John Malutich, both finishing with 4; Joe Meadows, Nathan Stark, Rob Roy Mace and Joe Reid, all with 3½. Jefferson County High School won the team title over Wirt County High School. Charles Szasz was the TD for this section

In the Middle School Section, a tie ensued for first place between Andrew Brock (South Middle School) and Justin Neace. Both achieved perfect 4-0 scores. An eight way tie for third included: Luke Trout, Stephen Malutich, Derrick O'Dell, Scott Binns, Bob Levdansky, Robert Smith, Alex Berrebi and newcomer Matthew Deal. South Middle School was the winner of the team championship. Elkins Middle School and Cheat Lake Middle School tied for second. David Bitler was the TD for the Middle School section

In the Elementary School Section, Steven Shear, a home school student from Berkeley Springs was the winner, finishing with an impressive 6-0 mark. Jamie Karraker and Nora Miller (Morgantown Learning Academy) and Jason Young tied for second with 5-1 ledgers. The Morgantown Learning Academy Team outpaced the Norwood Elementary Gold Team for first place. John Strovers was the TD for this section.

In the Primary School division, Truman Gore, a third grader from Adamston Elementary took first prize, scoring 5-0. Tied for second were Hannah Lubman, Ben Stratton, Victor Sivaneri and Ryan Butler all at 4-1. The Primary Team champs were the Norwood Elementary Gold Team. Teays Valley Christian took second place. John Glenn directed the Primary Section.

Thanks go to John Homer and Charles Szasz who have organized and run the Scholastic Championships for many years. Also, thanks to all the TDs who volunteered their time to make this event a success.

### Visiting SM Emory Tate Joins John Roush and Donald Griffith atop Taylor Books Winter Grand Prix leaderboard

A hearty crowd was on hand to participate in the first Charleston Chess Club tourney of the year - the Taylor Books Winter Grand Prix; including Senior Master Emory Tate. Exciting games were plentiful throughout the day, as many upsets and near upsets were brewing. Round 1 was actually subdued. The best game was the Gary Cummings - Dave Kennedy contest. Even though Gary won an exchange early, Dave did his best to tighten the position. As both players' clocks wound down, Gary finally was able to break through to earn a decisive advantage and soon enough the win.

The second round saw more interesting matchups. James Fuller gained a material advantage on John Roush, but John stormed back to take this game. Two upset draws occurred this round. With Jim Walker down to 20 seconds and no real chances for either side, Jim and Tom LaBue halved their game. Sefus Ellis survived his match with Jacqueline Guglielmi with a draw as well. He admitted to being lucky, but he wouldn't know how lucky until later.

Round three and the excitement continued. On Board one, Senior Master Emory Tate and John Roush drew. Look for John's annotations of this game later in this article. With Donald Griffith and Gary Cummings drawing their game, it left the winner of the David Saville - Robert Canary game in first place - Robert! Sefus Ellis gained ground on the lead by dispatching your editor. He was now standing at 2½ as well. Again, Ms. Guglielmi made her presence known among the top players as she defeated Jim Walker and left herself in the running for first place. The Malutich battalion also had a scalp to show and John (Jr.) defeated 1700+ rated Scott Carmichael.

For the final round, on Board 1 saw the match between Tate and Canary. Roush and Gary Cummings were paired on board three; board two was Griffith and Ellis. All three of the higher rated players won their games to finish at 3½. But perhaps, the game of the day was the Saville-Guglielmi contest. Both players slugged it out as their clocks wound perilously close to the end. Jacqueline had a material advantage, but some of it dwindled during the time scramble. As David's clock was dangerously low, he requested a digital clock be used. According to the new rules, this is equivalent to a

draw offer. After some rules discussion, Jacqueline decided to take the draw. It is unfortunate the game score did not survive the time scramble

As stated above, John Roush, Donald Griffith and Emory Tate finished in a tie for first. They shared the top prize money and the Novag Grand Prix points. The U1600 prize was shared by Jacqueline Guglielmi, James Fuller (rating was under 1600 at tourney time), and Bob McLear. Each ended the day with a score of 3 points.

A total of thirty two players participated in this Charleston Chess Club event. Chuck Waugh was the tourney director.

The Charleston Chess Club is sponsoring more events in the near future. The Summer Grand Prix and the Charleston Open are scheduled for June and July respectively. ### Charleston Chess Club Championship (8), 1998

The Modern Benoni is for many a modern mystery. It seems to fly in the face of traditional chess thinking. From very early on, black opens the e4-e5 door for his opponent, seemingly daring white to smash him flat. Thus many have dumped it unceremoniously in the dustbin. In many circles it is considered an amusement, but nothing to be taken too seriously. After all, the refutation is merely a matter of common sense ... or is it? Let us dare apply a little common sense ourselves and see where that takes us ...

# 1. d4 e6 2. Nf3 Nf6 3. c4 c5 4. d5 exd5 5. cxd5 d6 6. Nc3 g6 7. e4 Bg7 8. Bg5

A somewhat rare alternative which is very well motivated. White begins to apply some direct pressure to black's position. Since white is already beginning to fashion a noose, black will have to choose his moment to strike back very carefully.

#### 8...h6

This is considered by many to be the required and necessary way of dealing with the situation. Black hits back immediately and asks the bishop directly. However, it is not the only way. The previous year's contest between these two players continued instead 8...a6 9. Nd2 b5 10. Bd3 Nbd7 11. 0-0 0-0 12. a4 c4 13. Be2 Rb8 14. axb5 axb5 15. b4!? and now the noose was presented in earnest. The moment of truth had arrived and by continuing in the spirit of breakout before the chains are applied Black could continue 15...cxb3 and fight his way to a playable position after both 16. Qxb3 (16. Nxb3 b4 17. Nb5 h6 is even simpler) 16...Nc5 17. Qb4 and now Black carries the breakout theme to the limit with 17...Nxd5! 18. Bxd8 Nxb4 19. Bc7 Rb7 20. Bxd6 Bxc3 21. Bxc5 Rd8 Thus the real problem of the Benoni is clearly seen. Black must always be ready to break out before white succeeds in getting a grip.

#### 9. Bh4 a6 10. Nd2

10. a4 is the main way of handling matters, but white chooses to allow b7-b5 and play to undermine it later.

#### 10...b5 11. Be2 0-0 12. Qc2 Nbd7 13. 0-0 Re8 14. Rfe1 Qc7

14...Rb8 is another good continuation and might be considered slightly more accurate by some, one point being that 15. a4 can be met with 15...c4 since the loss of d4 is not serious since the Nd2, the Bh4 and the Qc2 have already turned away from it.

#### 15. a4 b4 16. Nd1

Revealing one of the points of Od1-c2.

#### 16...a5

Weighed on the ultra-fine scales of the Modern Benoni this may be a step in the wrong direction. 16...b3 is the most radical attempt to solve Black's problems as it attempts to fight for squares like b4 and e4 and also the b-file. Simply put, it is the breakout again. 17. Qb1 (17. Qxb3 Nxe4 also hangs together in view of 18. Bxa6 Bxa6 19. Rxe4 Rxe4 20. Nxe4 f5) 17...Rb8 and Black's idea starts to appear, he may follow with Rb8-b4 which pressures e4 and may also allow c5-c4, he may also fight for black squares like f4 and e5 by continuing g6-g5 at some point. If Black succeeds he may actually obtain a grip himself and force white to seek a breakout!

#### 17. f3

An important moment. White solidifies e4 and turns his attention to sewing up squares like b3 and c4. If he succeeds Black will be stuck without counterplay constantly watching out for e4-e5 and praying to get in an effective f7-f5 in an attempt to fight back.

Stepping out of the firing line and getting closer to b2-b3 and Nd2-c4.
