

### Good, Griffith, Walker take the top spot

The Charleston Open was the real kickoff of serious chess events for 2003. It tired a new format adding a Reserve Section to entice lower rated players simply to come and have a valid chance of winning a prize. The effect of this section, open only to those with a rating under 1400, was that the open section was rather top heavy and good matchups were happening in every round. Some very good games were taking place in the lower section as well.

James Fuller made a run at the title and was leading the event by a ½ point entering the last round. However, 'Steady Eddie' Donald Griffith stopped him in round five to become one of three to gain 4 points. Donald was the only player to get through the open section without a loss but even he was in a must win situation in the last round if he wanted a piece of the 1<sup>st</sup> place tie.

Making his way back after a third round upset to Fuller was James Walker. He had the last game to finish and with possible winning chances and a solid position he pulled the game out. A draw was likely at one point but his opponent, Alexandra Savurko of Belarus, disdained that outcome and took her chance on a complicated king walk and with both players entering a time scramble just came up short.


Benjamin Good also had to make a come back from a second round loss to Walker. His early loss, and the effect of color alterations, gave him a host of class 'B' players to overcome and he made good to get into the three way tie for 1st to 3rd.

Taking the class 'B' prize was Byron Funkhouser. Playing very well was Jeremy Green who recorded two upset wins and won the class 'C' prize.

In the Reserve section it looked like it would be another tie between Gilbert Stone and John Sefton after they drew in round two and both sat with 2 ½ points after three rounds. But Samual Rhodes, of North Carolina, stunned Stone in the fourth round, after losing to Sefton in the previous round, to both clear the way for a clear first by John Sefton and a clear second for Rhodes. Sefton defeated David Comer in round five and Rhodes got by William Salmon.

Making a debut in open chess events were two brave eleven year olds, Ben Shumate and Katherine King. It was Shumate who won their individual game in round two but could not keep pace with King as she scored three wins and took the Class D prize. She upset David Comer and David Hundley and then easily got by provisionally rated Andrew Cummings in round five to win a prize in her first open event.

The format of the event holds promise as a way to begin getting more scholastic players to come out and gain the skills that only over the board play can give. They will not be able to make a real challenge in even the major scholastic events if they do not take advantage of the availability of our good players at these sectional events as well as open events. They will need to learn from application as well as study. It is hoped that a repeat of this event's format on a larger scale can be attempted again with much preceding ado.







# The Guinness Book of World Records A tribute to the 1979 Charleston Chess Club

Boris Spassky was 32 and the new World Champion. He had just defeated Tigran Petrosian by a score of 12 ½ to 10 ½ in the FIDE World Championship match. It was 1969.

A little less mentioned event was the new world record for non stop chess. The twenty four year old Trevor Stronach of Hornsey, England had played for 72 hours nonstop.

Fast forward to 1979. The Charleston Regatta was kicking off with its first all week celebration and as part of its events offered a chance to set a Guinness world record in any event desired. At the age of 29 I was completely unaware of the Stronach record of 1969. I met with Dennis Funkhouser and suggested that I attempt to play nonstop five minute chess games for as long as I could. Dennis took over as the primary organizer and did a fantastic job. All I had to do was show up and start playing.

The entire membership of the Charleston Chess Club, both active and past members, were scheduled to fill the wee hours of the night to give me a constant set of opponents. As well as accepting any players from the gallery there was always someone there to fill in from the club.

The night before I was to begin I could not seem to fall asleep due the excitement of knowing I would be awake for as long as I was able to keep playing five minute games.

My early record was not very good. By the end of the second night I had evened my score and by the end of the my endurance, and the attempt at a record, I had won 271 games and lost 235. It was after the point of 78 ½ hours that I was no longer able to see the board and also was beginning to hallucinate about such things as who was on the move.

For about the last six hours of play I had been forced to keep one eye closed as I was no longer able to focus and was seeing 128 squares. Only if I reduced the number of my vision sensors by half could I make sense of the chess board. Up to a week later I could let my eyes come to rest on a blank wall and the green and white chess board would appear. The impression had been burned unto my retinas. It took 17 hours of deep sleep to recover.

The new Guinness world record was set. Since I was unaware that any such record had ever existed before and I simply thought that however long I played would set an original record. I did not start with any idea that there was a record to be beaten. It was simply that 78 ½ hours was my limit.


Again fast forward to 1993. I was repatriated by returning on the QE II to New York on July 6<sup>th</sup>. While waiting for my train to Washington I spent a couple of days in the city and one day found my way to the Guinness museum in the basement of the Empire State Building. I was walked by a display of world records set by state. When I arrived at the display for West Virginia I found no records mentioned.

Somehow the record did not get recorded afterwards by the Regatta Committee. It was for the members of the 1979 Charleston Chess Club who gave up some hours of sleep to help me set the record that I want to one more time remind one and all that it did happen. This page is for any who might wonder how long a nonstop session of five minutes chess has gone, well, the world record is 78 ½ hours set in Charleston, West Virginia in 1979 by a member of the Charleston Chess Club with unparalleled assistance from all the members of that club. These days about 7 or 8 or a half hours is my limit and theirs too.


### **STALEMATE**

The Basis of Endgame Theory (and source for a lot of cheap tricks) Compiled By Donald Griffith (with some required corrections by Gary Cummings)

You may think of stalemate as only something that beginners stumble into while trying to mate with King and Queen vs King. Actually, stalemate is at the heart of many endgames. For Example: Why is King + Rook pawn vs King drawn. Because this position is Stalemate.




Why is K+P vs K drawn when the defending side has the opposition





By its own mission statement the primary reason for the existence of the WVCA is to hold this event and proclaim for the period between the Labor Days our top player or players based only on this event. The WVCA is compelled to remember no one else in its achieves based on any other qualification than the result from this one event

There have been many champions now, and some were clearly the top players at the time of their respective victories and some were unexpected - out of no where - surprises. Statistics give us records of all variety but this year a totally new record was made.

The sole winner of the event was also the youngest sole WVCA champion. It was 13 year old Alex Dementiev who was able to maintain his energy and use his skill and bravado to eek out a half point lead with 5 points out of the six rounds of play. He took a clear lead after round 5 but the climatic sixth round of this event has seen many a front runner falter at the last obstacle. He withstood a last ditch charge by John Roush, who could only hope to gain a share of first with a win, and became the 2003, WVCA sanctioned, West Virginia state chess champion.

With one new record set another lost out. It was Mark Hathaway who hoped to move close to a tie for the record of six straight championship victories currently held by S. Werthemmer. The pure playing strength of the field, due to the small number of participants, caused him to have to face many a tough foe and the draws piled up. Surprisingly some stout resistance was encountered in the very first round by Russell Scott. This, and the gauntlet of experts and class A players, presented him a rough ordeal.

Another with hopes for the annals of WVCA history on his mind was Donald Griffith. He

stands only two WVCA championships short of tying the same S. Werthammer with a total of 13 WVCA championships.

The location was perfect in every respect with only the strange problem of lighting in the playing hall. Only in the dead center of the room was the light acceptable and as tables moved closer to the rim of the room the dimness became severe. The weather was "off and on" climatic but still pleasant and the humidity low. A refreshing change for all of the Charleston players.

The convention center staff were most helpful providing virtually anything that was asked or required.



# Charleston Chess Club Championship 2003

To finish the year the Charleston Chess Club has held its championship on a round robin basis for the last several years. With some the great old events, like the Holiday Open in Huntington and, the fall classics in Morgantown, now gone this format fills the empty days of fall where currently no chess life exists. This is no doubt in part to the recovery time required by some after the strain of the state championships.

In 2003 the contest was joined again. Ten players fought through nine rounds. Some perennials were missing this year but it was as always a generally hard fought event. Jim Walker won the event with 8 ½ points just ahead of John Roush with 8 points. A single draw was the difference. The two players made their way through the event without a loss. One of the most significant developments of this year's event was the swing back to William Salmon with his always highly anticipated encounters with James Olson. The game was scheduled in the first round and Salmon was tied for the lead for the first time in the history of the event.

#### On the Scholastic Chess Scene By Gary Cummings

Scholastic chess has seen a most rapid growth period and is only starting to stabilize now. The effects of the movie "Searching for Bobby Fischer" apparently had the most power to begin this trend. Here in West Virginia there has been much recent increased activity. Not short on the reasons is the realization that a scholastic state chess champion can venture to such prominent events as the Denker Classic and now the Polgar Invitational for the best female scholastic player from a state. From these events, full scholarships and trust fund scholarships make becoming eligible to play in them more than just a thrill.

In the Kanawha Valley this past year a doubling of the participants in a scholastic chess league and teams entered from a variety of schools has given hopes of an even greater increase in participation. Known as the KVSCL the league hosted two sections this past year for K6 and below and K7 and above. A great majority of the kids who played in this league then continued on to try their first state championship. The final objective of the league is to have the chess teams that these schools provide seen as true school sports teams and making being able to play on a school team a true accomplishment and an honor as well.

The KVSCL had ten 3 player teams in its K6 section and nine 3 player teams in the K7 and above section. In all 66 kids played in the league during its 2 and one half month schedule.

Jeremy Green won the high school state chess championship for the second year in succession. He was at first the selected representative for the state of WV for the Denker Classic but then it was discovered that he became 19 years of age before September. This disqualified him from participation. In his place the alternate of Eric Guffey was nominated.

Eric made the trip to the Denker as the representative for the state of West Virginia. He was the lowest rated player in the field of 46. He managed a tie for 32<sup>nd</sup> to 42<sup>nd</sup> with a last round upset over a player rated a full 200 points higher.

We do not have the attendance at our open events to hold tournaments with sections by class but the need for more Reserve sections joined alongside our open events might be the only logical method that would offer the needed degree of competition that the scholastic players in this state are lacking.

All is not bleak. I saw many promising players at the scholastic championships this past April. With the encouragement to participate in events with longer time controls and much more demanding competition there were several that make great leaps in skill level. tournament organizer who plans on putting together an open event is encouraged to setup a Reserve Section starting at under 1400 and equally offer prizes for players under 1200. This seems the best device to let the kids become more accomplished in the atmosphere and conditions that they are likely to find if they make it to the Denker or the Polgar.

### 2004 Kanawha Valley Open

The event held March 6 and 7 in the Charleston House Holiday Inn in Charleston, West Virginia was poorly attended. This very low degree of participation dealt a death blow to the long running Charleston Open planned for May or June. In this case it looks as if the saying should be "If you don't come, they won't build it".

The event saw some very lively games from the small group that did attend. Donald Griffith gained the clear first place spot with a score of 4 out of 5. Ben Good defeated Griffith in the last round to pull into a tie for second with Gary Cummings. With a win over Jason Young, who was the only player in the last round with a chance to tie Griffith, Cummings also gained 3 ½ points to match Good for 2<sup>nd</sup> through 3<sup>rd</sup> place.

Ben Good collected the class A prize while Cummings picked up the class B. Charles Waugh gained the class C prize with 2 ½ points, Gilbert Stone the class D prize with 2 ½ points and Katie King gathered in the class E/under prize with 1 ½.

Waugh's only rival for the C prize, Jim Olson, withdrew and did not play the last two rounds. Gilbert Stone, who drew with Cummings in round one, only had to better David Hundley. For King the only player that she needed to outscore was William Salmon. Both players obtained a forced bye win but only Katie was able to add another ½ point to her total.



#### 2004 WVCA Action Championship

The two tournaments specifically called for by the WVCA bylaws are the state championship to be held as a six round event over the Labor Day weekend and the Action Championship. It was hoped that the Action would be held approximately six months from the state championship. This year it ran a little late. It was held on June 12, 2004 at the Parks and Recreation room at the St. Albans Municipal Utilities Commission building.

The rounds were dropped to five rather than the expected six when only 12 players showed for the event. Ben Good became our new G/30 champion with a score of 4 ½ out those five rounds. #### The New Grand Prix

The change over was complete with the 2003 state championship. The cycle begins with the first WVCA GP event following each Labor Day state championship. Generally the home of only the best players, and still high finishes promise higher GP standings, the top ten finishers may now easily become filled with players from lower classes. The effect of simply a participation point for entering and bonus points for the best in a standard rating class allow even the players from the lowest rating groups to fight for a top ten finish. note the position of David Hundley's finish in the 2003 standings.

Regardless of the prize fund distribution, the Grand Prix points are awarded based on score plus and finish in a rating class group. This allows virtually anyone, in any rating class, to keep pace with the continual high scoring players by simply coming to a GP event. Even if there is no class prize at a specific GP tournament the Grand Prix points will be awarded in this manner. This can benefit a player from a lower rating group immensely.

#### TDs and Organizers:

The only promised GP events at the beginning of each cycle are the Action event and the concluding state championship. The current Bohemian Charleston Chess Club always registers any of its events as GPs and we urge all tournament organizers to do so as well. This ensures that the event may be advertised as a WVCA GP event and placed on the WVCA website listed as such. The current token registration fee is \$10. and should be sent to the WVCA secretary with this indication.

It is the intention, with the start of this publication, that the top ten finishers in the Grand Prix, beginning with the 2003 finishers, be listed with each new bulletin. This is meant to become a continual historical listing. Not to underplay the value of the state championship but to make an attempt to recognize and honor those who have continued to play through thick and thin to support chess in West Virginia and the WVCA.
