

West Virginia Chess Loses a Friend

As many of you know, West Virginia Chess lost one of our own last year. Mike Turner, a fixture of chess in southern West Virginia passed away much too early. Incidentally, we will be covering some of the Beckley tournaments in which he was involved both as a player and in an organizational role. For this information we thank Dave Hundley. In honor of Mike, we present the following tribute written by his good friend Jeff Crook.

Michael Turner

I guess it was one of those ‘meant to be’ things. It was the fall of 1980 and Mike and I were early into our Sophomore Year at Hinton High School (now called Summers County High School) in Hinton, WV. One day at school, Mike comes up to me clearly excited about something. In the bottom of his newly assigned locker, he had found a magazine. Not just any magazine, mind you, but a copy of a magazine called *Chess Life & Review* (yes it was that old of an issue).

We had learned the rules of chess on black and red squared fold-up checker boards back in the seventh grade. At that time, growing up in rural West Virginia, chess was just one of many possible sources of entertainment for a 12 year old in elementary school. We were much

more into playing baseball, admiring the girls, or just being mischievous in general. The allure of the 64 squares had not yet taken hold.

Later when we reached the 9th grade, we moved onto the high school where Mike and I soon discovered they had a chess club. Mutual friends first got us interested and before long we were spending every lunch period in the classroom of the faculty chess club sponsor. We played a game or two everyday. We were not very good and we did not improve much that first year or so. No one in the club, including the **(Continued on the next page)**

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sponsor, was aware that any sort of national chess organization existed. Our only exposure to anything relatively close to organized chess was a few matches with other high schools, none of which were rated or otherwise affiliated with the USCF. That didn't really matter, as neither Mike nor I played well enough to be on the team for those matches. We were both still active with baseball, among other activities, playing together on a successful high school team (at least by southern West Virginia standards at the time). As such, chess appeared destined to be one of those hobbies that we would inevitably discontinue in due time.

All that changed when Mike found that old copy of *Chess Life & Review*. Like two explorers looking over a newly found treasure map for the first time, Mike and I gleamed with excitement as we learned about chess notation, chess openings (I thought every game started with P-K4), chess tournaments, and the chess rating system. Mike soon sent a letter to the USCF and in short order we had a current magazine, junior memberships, and were off to play in organized tournaments. To borrow an overly used cliché, the rest is history.

I have often thought about the seemingly innocent happenstance of that magazine being in Mike's newly assigned locker. I'm not sure that Mike or I ever knew how it came to have been there, but I am so glad that it did. For me, not only did it transform a hobby into a passion, but it was the genesis for all the great experiences and friendships I've developed through the greatest of games. Most importantly, it helped to further cement one of the great friendships of



my life that began at the age of five and continued until now and will always be.

Thank you Michael Turner for being my friend and for finding that magazine.

The two co-champions drew their individual game and both had unfortunate experiences against David Saville. Both found themselves up a pawn against the rascally Mr. Saville, disdained his offer of a draw and found to their horror that what seemed to be "not enough comp for the pawn" proved instead to be "more than enough comp for the pawn"!

Redkin, Butcher, & Parhi tied for third with scores of 4 – 2. The latter two took the Under 1900 prize, with Iorio right behind in that category at 3 – 3. The Under 1600 prize went to Jim Fields at 3 – 3 with Celli finishing second at 2 – 4. The Under 1300 prize went to Wunderkind Adi Patal at 2 – 4 with Greer finishing second at 1 – 5.

Robert Greer organized and directed this six round event April 9, 2011 in Bridgeport, West Virginia.
