WHEELING CHESS PLAYERS FORM CLUB

Our newest chess club organizer, William Cuthbert, 88 Washington Avenue, Wheeling, is meeting with success in the early stages of his attempt to form a group of chess players in his home city, and from the progress already made, we predict he will carry the effort forward to complete success.

A letter from Bill, under date of May 27, says:

"The Wheeling Chess Club is now in existence, though perhaps not too lustily. We had our first meeting Monday evening, May 19, at the Wheeling YMCA. Kurt Fox, secretary of the Y, made us welcome, donated three sets of chessmen and six boards, and gave us the use of a very good room. Orchids to him and the Y!

"Eleven were present out of some 30 notified by postcard. While this was not as many as we'd have liked, several not present sent their regrets at being unable to come and signified intent to join.

"At any rate, we had a brief business meeting, at which we appointed an interim executive committee, composed of Al C. Dobbs, Sr., chairman, the Rev. William M. Erhard and Mr. Fox. Their duty is to draw up a brief constitution and by-laws, recommend a club program, and fix the basic amount needed for dues (to cover postage mostly). I will act as secretary until we elect one.

"Others present at the meeting were Archie Charnock, Tem deProspero, R. F. Hartfield, Arthur L. Irwin, A. W. Paull, B. E. Stover and Maynard Wallace. We agreed to meet every Monday at 8 p. m. at the Y.

"Mr. Paull offered us the use of the auditorium of the Wheeling Stamping Co. as an alternate meeting place. This will be useful for overflow meetings, appearances of exhibition players, and possibly as a site for the state tournament when we hold it here.

"At our second meeting Monday, May 26, we did not have quite so many present, but got in quite a lot of chess, and we are not discouraged about the future.

"If any visiting chessers are here on Monday nights, they will be very welcome to drop in at our club."

KANAWHA JR. MEET ENOS IN THREE-WAY TIE

A trio of Charleston high school players tied for the junior chess champion-ship of Kanawha County in a tournament held the week-end of May 23-25 at the Charleston TMCA--a tournament conducted by the Charleston Chess Club, with the cooperation of the Carbide Chess Club of South Charleston.

Ted Bingamon, Edward Holt and Larry Kinnamon each finished with 4-l scores to become co-champions of the county, insofar as junior chess is concerned. David Marples of South Charleston high was fourth with 2-3, while Robert Swarbrick and Benny Argento (both of South Charlestom, the former a high school student) tied for last place with $\frac{1}{2}$ - $4\frac{1}{2}$.

The three co-champions all took part in the recent City of Charleston chess tournament, young Holt capturing second place in the consolation division. Holt and Kinnamon are high school seniors; Bingamon, a junior.

CLARKSBURG CHESS CLUB NOTES

Under the auspices of the Clarksburg Chess Club, a women's chess club has been organized, with Mrs. Hardin R. Harmer as president and Miss Rosalie Poling as vice president and secretary. The women's group will meet simultaneously with the CCC. All women interested in learning chess have been invited to attend.

The Washington Irving High School Chess Club, which also meets with the CCC, now "boasts an active membership of 13 pawn-pushers."

Maj. Daniel Galligher, regular Army officer organizing National Guard units at Clarksburg, has expressed interest in the club there and said he plans to bring some of his fellow soldiers to sessions.

Re the women players now taking part in sessions at Clarksburg, Ray Griffin writes (May 9): "I played one game against Miss Poling two or three weeks ago; it lasted an hour and a quarter, and she won. Later, she played a game against Bill Challinor, and won; then lost one to Dr. Humphries. She and Mrs. Harmer played five games. The score: Miss Poling, 3; Mrs. Hafmer, 2. They are both pretty good."

Writes Secy. Wisinski of the Clarksburg club (May 22): "We've had so many new players entering at recent sessions that the Harrison County Tournament schedule has got slightly out of line but we hope to speed it up now. It is progressing slowly but it keeps up interest, and that's what we want. Also it gives newcomers an immediate chance to play against the old members. We haven't developed any chess geniuses yet but have some fairly good players, and they'll get better with more practice. The Francis Cunningham you asked about is from Bridgeport; he does not do badly—won a tournament game from City Champinn M.F. "Hap' Allison!...If we can keep up interest thru the summer, we plan a City Tournament this fall."

An amusing note from Attorney Kingsley Smith (May 24), in re our curiosity about his ability as a chess club organizer: "My position in the chess world is that of an interested tyro who has a perpetual slow burn on because we can't get more than 20 or 30 of the hundreds of chess players in Harrison county to attend our meetings. I adhere strictly to your philosophy that the best idea is continuous publicity." (Attorney Smith is doing a fine job and we know he will be rewarded for his arduous labors with a first-class, progressive chess club.)

Clarksburg Chess Club officials say they are on the lookout for a visiting master to give a simultaneous exhibition. We hope one will be available in the near future, even tho it is a little past the formal exhibition season.
